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
Letters Policy

God deserves credit for cease-fire

To the editors:

How do I meet Colin Craig, director of Corrymeela Community? His comments in your article on the IRA ceasefire were right on target (Catholic Courier, Sept. 8: "Hope, wariness greet ceasefire in Ireland").

It is essential that a lasting peace be built upon a grass-roots outreach, a "person-to-person, region to region" dialogue. We need to remember that Catholic and Protestant are both Christians, worshiping the same God and. fighting the same enemy.

I also share Mr. Craig's concern about the impact "triumphalism" would have on loyalists, who feel threatened with the loss of their very identities. While I can't muster an unreserved love for men who are capable of murdering pregnant woman and sleeping, unarmed men, I do understand the tremendous fear and sense of abandonment they must feel.

Ireland is indeed becoming increasingly secularized, though I cannot view this as a positive development. If religion has been used in the past to divide and conquer, my wish for Ireland now is that God would restore in Her people the power of Christian love to overcome differences and unite. Her slide into secularism will only serve to increase apostasy among all Her people, Catholic and Protestant.

Lastly, I would like to comment on the mutual back-slapping occurring between politicians as a result of the ceasefire. I realize that months and years of effort have been expended on the peace initiative, but why is it that not once have I heard anyone give the slightest credit to God? And while the IRA must certainly be commended, along with Gerry Adams and Sinn Fein, for their absolutely essential role in this new hope for peace, the fact is not one thing would have changed without the will and direction of God.

I continue to pray for a peaceful unification of Ireland, knowing that when it occurs, there is only One who can legitimately claim the glory for the miracle He bestows.

parish's name and address with the pastor's name. Twenty-seven percent of Haitian children die before age 5.
