## Kings break loose with big win over Hornell

Now, this is the kind of football Bishop Kearney knew it could play all along.

In four remarkable quarters, BK vented the frustration of several narrow losses suffered during 1994. The Kings stomped all over Hornell, 40-8, in a game held Friday, Oct. 14, at Kearney.

"The kids played a perfect game," stated BK Coach Nick Teta.

Patrick Goode was the catalyst, scoring Kearney's first three touchdowns on runs of 39, 61 and 48 yards. Vernon Banks added a 21-yard TD run as the Kings' first-half lead swelled to 28-2; and BK's defense and special teams registered two second-half scores: Kevin Goode on a 62-yard interception return, and Andre Valente on a blocked punt which he recovered in the end zone.

Patrick Goode finished the night with 211 rushing yards on only 10 carries.

Kearney gained its second win of the season against five defeats. Despite the impressive victory, BK missed out on qualifying for the Section 5 Class C playoffs and will instead play a non-league contest this weekend (the opponent had not been determined at press time).

"I think we had a shot to win (sectionals) if we'd gotten in," Teta remarked.

Under a new Section 5 format this season, eight teams advance to the playoffs in each of six divisions. The only diocesan squad to qualify was Geneva DeSales, which gained the seventh seed in Class D despite a 41-10 home loss to Red Jacket on Oct. 15. DeSales (1-6) will travel to second-seeded Elba on Saturday afternoon, Oct. 22, for a quarterfinal playoff game.

Ben Kiley scored DeSales' lone touchdown against Red Jacket on an 80-yard kickoff return in the first quarter, and Steve Davoli booted a 31-yard field goal

in the second period.

McQuaid Jesuit (2-5) and Aquinas Institute (2-5) also came up short last weekend. McQ fell 26-18 to Fairport at the University of Rochester on Oct. 14; and AQ was stopped 16-8 by host Wilson Magnet on Oct. 15.

McQuaid held a 12-6 first-half lead over Fairport on a 91-yard touchdown pass play from Mike Kehoe to Sean Finucane and a 39-yard run by Tim Tyre, but the Red Raiders ran off 20 unanswered points before Kehoe scored on an eight-yard run in the fourth quarter.

Aquinas rallied from an 8-0 deficit against Wilson when James Miner made a two-yard touchdown run and Kyle Magee threw to Jay Wegman for a two-point conversion to tie the score at 8-8 in the second quarter. However, the Wildcats' Enoch Wofford got the deciding TD on a three-yard carry in the final period.

In the Southern Tier, Elmira Notre Dame (6-1) atoned for its only loss of the season in a big way. The Crusaders handed visiting Troy a 40-8 defeat on Oct. 14 after having endured a 52-14 loss to Tioga one weekend earlier.

"We felt we had embarrassed ourselves, and we wanted to redeem ourselves. Unfortunately for Troy, they were our next opponent," Coach Mike D'Aloisio commented. "We executed pretty well."

Joel Stephens scored the Crusaders' first two touchdowns on runs of 25 and four yards. He finished with 251 yards on 26 carries, giving him 1,525 yards for the year. Other ND scores came from Ian Lampman on a one-yard carry; Mike Berrettini on a 10-yard pass from Chris Madigan; and Ben Saks and Rick Maxa on three-yard runs.

The Crusaders must now win their remaining two games — at home against Moravia on Oct. 21 and at Whitney Point on Oct. 29 — to maintain any hope of qualifying for post-season play.



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
