The order's public-relations department asked the jubilarians about their ministerial careers. The following are selected remarks by those sisters observing their 50th and 25th anniversaries

50 years

Sister Agnes Catherine Battersby, SSJ, an Elmira native, began her teach-

ing career in 1946 and served as principal of St. Mary's School in Canandaigua and DeSales High School in Geneva. Additionally, she served as pastoral assistant at St.



Patrick's in Corning and as a member of the congregation's Central Administration. Sister Agnes Catherine finds pastoral ministry very rewarding, but added, "I've loved every place I've been and I'm very grateful for all the people I have had the opportunity to work with"

Sister Agnes Catherine is currently pastoral assistant at St. James Church in Waverly.

Sister Ann d'Assisi Donofrio, SSJ, a Rochester native, remarked, "The ministry of teaching is my great delight! By working with children, it is possible to open their hearts and minds to understand God's love for them, to unlock



their God-given talents and build their self-confidence. I have fond memories of my early years of teaching in Elmira, Ithaca and Corning where, in addition to teaching, I worked with children's choir as they sang in praise of God. It was also a privilege preparing them for First Holy Communion. Most recently, these past 22 years at Nazareth Hall have been enriching, teaching multicultural groups of children, all accepting and working with each other — practicing, as in the Gospels — we are all one in Christ."

Sister Ann now teaches at Nazareth Hall in Rochester.

Sister Helen Goschke (Sister Francis Helen), SSJ, a Rochester native, said,

"Twenty-four years of teaching grade-school pupils at all levels were both challenging and enjoyable, and some pupils still keep in touch. Twenty-six years of minister-



ing in various ways to adults in parishes have enriched my life and broadened my viewpoint. Both ministries have been most rewarding. Both deepened my faith by making me more aware how God works in so many different ways his won-

ders to perform. I am grateful, too, for the support and encouragement that is so much a part of our community life as Sisters of St. Joseph."

Sister Helen is currently working as director of the RCIA program at Nativity of the Blessed Virgin Mary Church in Brockport

Sister Marion Gundell, SSJ, a Rochester native, served teaching as-

signments in Rochester and Auburn before attending Catholic University of America, where she received a master's degree in social work. She has served as a so-



cial worker at St. Joseph's Villa and as director of social work at St. Ann's Home. "It is with great joy and thanksgiving that I celebrate 50 years as a Sister of St. Joseph," she said. "I am grateful for the many gifts I have received during these years in terms of education, challenging and enriching ministries, and life-giving, happy community wherever I was assigned. After Vatican Council II, it was a privilege to be a member of a congregation that wholeheartedly embraced and implemented the document on Renewal of Religious Life. May God continue to bless us all."

Sister Marion now serves as local coordinator of the SSJ motherhouse.

Sister Virginia Mahaney, SSJ, a Rochester native, remarked, "In the first 33 years of my ministry, I served in education. I especially enjoyed teaching the primary grades. It was so satisfying watching the children develop in different areas of growth — intellectually, spiritually, emotionally and physically. As I moved into teaching of the middle



grades, I could appreciate and wonder at the progress they made as they continued to develop in life. Later as I worked for nine years in parish ministry, I was able to minister to and with a broader scope of people of the church — children and adults, the sick, the lonely, families and single people, the old and the young. People have helped me to grow and hopefully, I made a difference in their lives."

Sister Mary Austin, SSND, also entered the order from Roxbury, Mass., professing in 1934. She taught at schools in Washington, D.C., Massachusetts, New Jersey, New York City before serving at Bishop Kearney High School in Rochester from 1964-73. She has been serving on the staff of the order's archives in Wilton, Conn., since 1978.

Sister Alice Marie Donnelly, SSND, also entered the order from Roxbury,

Mass., making her final profession in 1934. She served as a teacher at St. Boniface School in Rochester from 1934-45, and as a principal of Holy Ghost School in Rochester from 1960-64. She also served at schools in Puerto Rico and in New Jersey. She has been in pastoral ministry at St. John's Parish in Leonia, N.J., since 1980.

Sister M. Alida Ford, SSND, entered the order from Immaculate Conception Parish in Malden, Mass., professing her final vows in 1934. In addition to teaching at St. Michael's School in Rochester from 1934-45, she served as principal at schools in Maryland, Massachusetts, Connecticut and New Hampshire. She currently lives at the Lourdes Health Center in Wilton.

Sister M. Leonice Jenks, SSND, entered the School Sisters from St. Francis de Sales Parish in Charlestown, Mass., making her final profession in 1934. She taught at St. Michael's School in Rochester from 1951-55, and served as teacher and principal at a number of other schools throughout the northeast. She currently lives at the Lourdes Health Care Center in Wilton.

Sister M. Amata Schneggenburger, SSND, entered the order from St. Mary's Parish in Buffalo, professing her final vows in 1934. She taught at St. Boniface School in Rochester from 1946-49, and at Holy Ghost School in Rochester from 1959-66.
