DeSales gains inspiration from OT victory

Less meant more for Geneva DeSales last week: the smaller the point differential, the greater the game's impact.

Had the Saints lost their overtime boys' basketball game against South Seneca, the effect may have been especially frustrating for a team that's hungry for victories after finishing with a 4-16 record last season.

Yet DeSales may look back at this contest as a major turning point after its clutch play led to a 54-52 home win over the Falcons last Friday, Dec. 9.

The triumph gave DeSales a 2-3 record and helped the Saints to end the week on a positive note after they lost 69-52 at Honeove on Dec. 7.

"I think it was very important. It brings us up a level from where we were in the past," said Coach Tony Alvaro.


DeSales trailed South Seneca 31-26 at halftime before a 15-8 third-quarter edge enabled Alvaro's squad to take a two-point lead into the final period. Jayson Lamson forced overtime when he popped a three-point basket with 10 seconds left in regulation to tie the score at 50-50.

Mike DeVaney performed the overtime heroics. He not only hit a baseline jumper with 20 seconds to go for the game's final points, but he also made a crucial steal with :08 remaining which enabled the Saints to run the clock out.

Lamson and Robert Peters led De-Sales with 17 and 14 points, respectively. Lamson was also the team's high scorer in the Honeoye loss with a 20-point effort

In girls' basketball, Kearney (1-0) captured its season debut with a 58-31 rout of visiting Brighton on Dec. 10. Shannon Hogan was BK's top scorer with 16 points.

ND wrestlers hope to overcome early-season difficulties

In a program of this caliber, success is normally a given rather than a goal.

However, the challenge to win will be a lot stiffer this year for Elmira Notre Dame's wrestlers.

ND is coming off last winter's thirdplace finish in the Section 4 Class D championships after winning the sectional crown the previous two years. Unfortunately, Coach Steve Weber noted that the 1994-95 Crusaders' progress has been slowed by a recent tragedy which struck the entire Notre Dame community.

Sophomore Dale McKay, who would have wrestled in the 177-pound weight

class, was killed in an automobile accident on Nov. 27. His death caused the cancellation of ND's entire scrimmage schedule, as well as its opening match against Groton.

When the Crusaders did return to the mat, they finished an uncharacteristic 10th out of 10 teams in the Susquehanna Valley Tournament Dec. 9-10. Still, Weber feels that ND will be competitive once it can get mentally and emotionally back on track.

"We've got the potential to be a good team," he remarked. "If we can finish above .500 it would be a real accomplishment, although it's not the same kind of goal we've had in the past. Individually, we should do real well."

The Crusaders' lineup features fresh-
