Early spurt lifts Little Irish girls over Lasers

The Aquinas Institute girls' basketball squad may be unpredictable, but it's definitely improving.

With an assortment of players making their way into the lineup, no two Little Irish games are ever quite the same. And in two meetings against neighboring Private-Parochial League rival Nazareth Academy, every quarter has been an adventure for AQ.

Back on Jan. 10, Aquinas compiled a 30-point third quarter en route to a 61-35 win. The Little Irish were headed for a similar rout when they raced to a 16-2 lead after one period in their rematch with Nazareth last Wednesday, Feb. 1, at AO.

However, Coach Tom Moffat pulled his starting five and the score quickly became 16-14. The starters returned and staked Aquinas to a 27-16 halftime lead, but the Lasers played AQ on even terms after that point before the Irish emerged with a 51-41 win.

"I want to give my bench some significant playing time when the game means something," Moffat said of his early substitutions, explaining that he'd like his reserves to be ready if needed for the upcoming Section 5 playoffs.



Aquinas followed up the Nazareth victory with season-high offensive production in a 63-41 win at Harley Allendale-Columbia on Feb. 3. That triumph was the Little Irish's third straight and lifted their season record to 8-8.

"From the first day of practice to now, they've improved by leaps and bounds," Moffat commented.

Fran Iacovangelo had her biggest game of the year against Nazareth, compiling 15 points, nine rebounds, six steals and three blocked shots. Laura Bilak led the Irish against H-A-C with a season-

Yet the Knights have fared better in this realm than many corporations. Despite forfeiting at least three weight classes in many of its meets, McQuaid is once again champion of the City-Catholic League.

The Knights, who clinched their fifth consecutive league crown with a 42-27 victory at Edison Tech last Tuesday, Jan. 31, finished with a 4-0 record in City-Catholic meets.

John Morris (126 pounds), Brian Beecher (132), Adam Lehmann (167) and Brandon Rood (215) all recorded pins for McQ against Edison.

Actually, the Knights' most pivotal league confrontation, according to Coach Lou Teike, came on Jan. 5 when they won 39-32 at home over East.

Teike was concerned about that meet's outcome not because he thought the Orientals had superior talent, but "only because I know for the most part East carries a full lineup," he said. The Knights wound up forfeiting four matches that day but still triumphed.

High School – approaches. Six McQuaid wrestlers had already cracked the 20-win barrier through the end of last week. Their projected weight class for sectionals, and individual records, are:
