 to pilot a program promoting environ-
 mental justice through parish struc-
 tures.

A new Food Bank facility opened in
 Fishersville to enhance service deliv-
 ery to 135 food pantries and soup
 kitchens in the service network.

Gateways Community Living Pro-
 gram was authorized to expand resi-
 dential services, preventive case man-
 agement services, and establish a
 social club in Chemung County.

A collaborative process was initiated
 with St. James Mercy and St. Joseph's
 Hospital in an effort to better serve the
 people of the Southern Tier.

This agency which has served the region
 since 1982, works for social change and
 provides direct human services to indi-
 viduals and families in Yates, Ontario, Wayne,
 Seneca and Cayuga counties. Services are
 available to anyone in need regardless of reli-
 gious affiliation or ability to pay.

Counseling Services are provided to individu-
 als, couples and families experiencing difficul-
 ties such as depression, family violence, mari-
 tal stress, parenting and grief issues. Referrals
 come from parishes, other agencies and the
 community.

**The Separated/Divorced/Bereaved
 Program** coordinates an informal
 support system with a variety of
 social, educational and spiritual
 activities that enable coping in a
 more positive way.

**Emergency Services and Family
 Housing** provides direct assistance to
 persons in need of food, shelter, med-
 icine, transportation, utilities and
 other essentials.

The agency owns five single-family
 homes in Geneva and leases them to
 large families in need of decent, safe
 and affordable housing.

Building Coalitions: the agency is active in
 convening community groups and building
 coalitions around issues of social concern such
 as poverty, hunger, homelessness, violence
 and cultural diversity. Some specific areas of
 concern addressed with positive results are
 housing, economic development, childcare
 and migrant farmworkers.

Nutrition Outreach improves the health and
 nutritional status of low income people in
 Ontario, Seneca and Yates counties. Agency
 outreach workers enable consumers to apply
 for Food Stamps and WIC (Women Infants
 and Children) benefits. With agency promo-
 tion and assistance, the number of School
 Breakfast and Summer Food programs in the
 area increased from 7 to 29.

Parish Social Ministry's assistance and sup-
 port are provided to local parishes in planning
 and implementing social service and social
 action activities, including training, needs

assessment and spirituality programs. The
 agency also works collaboratively on specific
 service and advocacy projects with interfaith
 groups.

The Maternity & Single Parenting Program
 provides counseling, advocacy, support and
 referral services for single, pregnant and par-
 enting women, and single parenting men,
 their families and significant others. Services
 include support groups, workshops, home
 visits, parenting and childcare education and
 community networking.



In 1994...
 The agency received a grant of \$20,000 to
 enhance outreach and counseling services to
 pregnant women, single parents and their
 children.

A "Families in Transition" workshop series
 was offered to 200 single parents in Cayuga
 County.

The Annual Parish Social Ministry Day held
 in March, featured Sister Barbara Moore, RSM
 speaking on "Communities of Salt & Light,"
 the National Catholic Bishops' pastoral letter.

Currently, the diocesan director of
 Catholic Charities serves as Human
 Life Coordinator, promoting
 Consistent Life Ethic priorities
 throughout the Diocese.

The Diocesan Public Policy
 Committee is staffed by this office
 in carrying out recommendations
 re: public policy priorities and
 advocacy strategy.

The convening of Catholic health-

care agencies, human services
 agencies and parishes is the respon-
 sibility of this office.

The office initiates and maintains
 relationships with affiliated agen-
 cies including Bishop Sheen
 Ecumenical Housing Foundation,
 Camp Stella Maris, DePaul Mental
 Health Services, Kinship Family and
 Youth Services, Worker Ownership
 Resource Center and Providence
 Housing Development Corporation.

In 1994...
 Providence Housing Development
 Corp. was created to provide devel-
 opment and management services
 for affordable, special needs and

senior citizen housing.

A Catholic Charities of Livingston
 County Steering Committee was
 established to explore the possibili-
 ty of creating a permanent county
 agency presence.

A formal diocesan healthcare collabo-
 ration planning process was coordi-
 nated by Catholic Charities, involv-
 ing Catholic healthcare agencies,
 human service agencies and parishes.

A diocesan-wide parish-based cam-
 paign was organized urging inclu-
 sion of universal access and exclu-
 sion of abortion as two major feder-
 al healthcare reform priorities.
