

Led by a first-place showing in the Best Front Page category and several photographic honors, the Catholic Courier garnered seven awards at the New York Press Association's 1994 Better Newspaper Contest.

Winners were announced during the NYPA's annual spring convention, held April 7-8 at The Desmond in Al-

Three front-page layouts and stories comprised the Courier's winning entry in Division II (the largest circulation division) for tabloid newspapers. The following stories featured graphics by Lorraine Hennessey, graphics manager, and photos by S. John Wilkin, staff photographer: "Veritatis Splendor" (written by Staff Writer Rob Cullivan;) the 50th anniversary of D-Day (written by Staff Writer Mike Latona); and the spirituality of men (Latona).

"Extremely inviting and attractively eye-catching," the judges said of the



front-page designs. "Not afraid to innovate and make a strong statement."

Also in the largest circulation category, Wilkin won second place for Sports Action Photo and shared with the graphics department a third place in the Photographic Excellence category. The staff photographer also took third place for Pictorial Photo and Picture Story (text by Lee Strong on diocesan efforts to educate students with special needs) and honorable mention for Sports Feature Photo.

In addition, Mary Kay Williams, a free-lance illustrator, earned an honorable mention for Graphic Illustration in the largest circulation category. Williams' illustration of Pope John Paul II knocking at the doors of the United Nations accompanied Cullivan's page-one story on preparations for last fall's world conference on population and development.

Obituary

Jessie Bell O'Connor; longtime nurse, teacher

Jessie Bell O'Connor, a graduate of St. Mary's School of Nursing who later taught at the school before serving as an industrial nurse at Eastman Kodak Company for 25 years, died on Thursday, March 23, 1995, after a long illness.

Bishop Matthew H. Clark and Father John L. O'Connor, Mrs. O'Connor's surviving son and pastor of Brighton's Our Lady of Lourdes Church, celebrated a Mass of Christian Burial at St. John the Evangelist Church in Greece. Bishop Robert R. Spears, retired Episcopal bishop of Rochester, also attended the Mass.

According to Father O'Connor, his mother was well-known for emphasizing a fundamental lesson to her students: "Treat every patient as you would your own mother or father."

He added that his mother's motto in life was returned to her during her long illness when a host of friends and caregivers were constantly at her side.

Mrs. O'Connor's death came 18 days after the passing of her sister, Sister Angela Marie Bell, SSJ, a Sister of St. Joseph of Rochester for 77 years. The two women were the youngest and oldest, respectively, of five children of the late William and Elizabeth McVeigh Bell.

In addition to her parents and sister, Mrs. O'Connor was predeceased by her husband, Jerry; two brothers, William, R. and John P. Bell; and another sister, Anne C. Bell.

The family said friends may have Masses offered in Mrs. Moroney's memory.

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
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
