Stations of the Cross come to life


Youth-group members from St. Theodore's Church in Gates performed an afternoon Living Stations of the Cross for parishioners on April 9.

If crowd appreciation had counted for anything, then Bishop Kearney's color guard would be the clear-cut winner.

"We got a standing ovation. There were 16,000 people on their feet, screaming. It was phenomenal," said Ann O'-Connell, faculty moderator for the Bishop Kearney Color Guard.

As it turned out, the judges happened to agree with the spectators who packed the Dayton Arena last Saturday, April 8, when BK won its third consecutive World Guard International world championship.

This marks the first time in the competition's history, spanning more than 30 years, that a school has won the event three consecutive times.

Under the direction of coach/choreographer Vincent Monacelli, Kearney's 27-member, all-girls' team scored 97.9 out of a possible 100 points. They defeated 20 other color guards who reached the championship round, including traditional rival Miamisburg of Ohio, which finished second.

BK performed a routine titled "Sybil," which interprets the inner turmoil and distress of multiple personalities.

"It was very difficult, with lots of equipment. They really had to work hard on it," O'Connell said.

BK went undefeated during the 1994-95 season, winning several Rochesterarea and regional competitions.




