# Baseball, softball teams knocked out of playoffs

Spring seasons ended a few days earlier than desired for four diocesan baseball and softball teams.

**Elmira Notre Dame baseball** — fresh off its Section 4 Class D title win last Monday, June 5 — returned to action less than 24 hours later and suffered a 7-4 loss to Frewsburg of Section 6 (Buffalo area). The state quarterfinal contest was played June 6 at Jamestown.

Notre Dame held the upper hand early against Frewsburg, scoring three second-inning runs with the aid of Steve Janeski's two-run single. However, the Crusaders couldn't maintain a 4-2 lead they'd built up after four innings.

"I was surprised we got to that point. It was all heart; they were beat (physically) going into the game. Not having the opportunity to rest just killed us," said Coach Jim Marks, referring to fatigue created by ND's extra-inning win over Groton June 5. Then the players had to endure the long bus ride down Route 17 to Jamestown the next day.

The Crusaders' advantage disappeared when they committed a total of five errors in the fifth and sixth innings, allowing the Bears to score two runs in the fifth and three more in the sixth.

Notre Dame finished its title season with a 15-10 record. The Crusaders were ranked in the top five of the state's Class D rankings all year long.

At **Geneva DeSales**, the baseball team was denied a sectional crown despite compiling an 18-3 mark and the Finger Lakes West co-championship.

DeSales, seeded No. 1 in Section 5 Class D, was edged 1-0 by No. 4 Bradford in a semifinal game which took place June 6 at Hornell.

The game's sole run came in the sixth inning, when the Braves' J.J. Smith

singled in Jeremy Bratz.

DeSales starting pitcher Jayson Lamson allowed only seven singles but was bested by Bradford's Jody Howell, who tossed a three-hit shutout.

Another No. 1 seed was stymied in semifinal play when **Our Lady of Mercy softball** fell to No. 4 Churchville-Chili, 6-0, in a Section 5 Class BB game June 7 at Irondequoit's McAvoy Park.

The game offered an intriguing sisterly twist: Churchville eighth-grader Karen Kurycki — who halted the Monarchs on two hits — is the sister of Mercy pitcher/outfielder Katie Kurycki.

Churchville's offense produced two runs in the second inning, one in the third and three in the sixth. Meanwhile, the Monarchs struggled with Karen Kurycki's blazing pitches as they suffered their only shutout loss of the year.

"If we'd seen her one time before, it would have made a difference," commented Coach Mike Baxter, whose Monarchs beat the Saints 31-17 April 29 — while Karen Kurycki was still playing on the Churchville JVs.

Mercy finished with a 20-3 record, setting a school mark for wins and earning the Private-Parochial League title.

Finally, **Bishop Kearney baseball's** dark-horse bid ended with a 4-2 loss to Wellsville in the Section 5 Class A semifinals June 6 at Wayland-Cohocton.

BK, seeded 11th, had reached the semis by upending No. 6 Waterloo and No. 3 Honeoye Falls-Lima. But the Kings only scored in the second and sixth innings against second-seeded Wellsville while allowing runs in the second, third, fourth and seventh.

The Kings' final mark was 11-13, yet their best ball came at playoff time.

"I guess we weren't supposed to go this far. It was a tough season, but sectionals gave us a new life," said Coach Ed Nietopski.

## Knights flourish in state track

Strong showings from McQuaid Jesuit athletes helped Section 5 take first place in boys' team scoring at the New York State Public High School Athletic Association track championships. The meet was held June 9-10 at the University of Buffalo.

Pole vaulter Greg Schlachter soared to a fourth-place finish, recording a vault of 14 feet, 0 inches. He had qualified for states by placing second in the Section 5 Meet of Champions the previous weekend.

The Knights' Tim Tyre, running the 400-meter leg, helped the Section 5 inter-sectional relay team to a second-place finish with a time of 10 minutes, 37.53 seconds. Other relay members were Irondequoit's Peter Munyan, Canandaigua's Tom Stuart and Penfield's Tim Reetz.

Also from McQuaid, the Knights' Jeff Clark took 16th place in the 3,200-meter run with a time of 10:02.8.

Section 5 totaled 125 points to easily outdistance Section 11, which finished with 85. In girls' team scoring, Section 5 placed eighth.

Additional state track highlights came from the following diocesan high-school athletes:

•Our Lady of Mercy's 3,200 relay finished seventh in girls' competition with a clocking of 9:49.85. The quartet of Jessie Dugan, Lindsay Wegman, Danni LaMagna and Christine DeMott surpassed their previous-best time of 9:54.1 set in a first-place performance at the Meet of Champions.

finished eighth in the girls' 100 meters. Her time was 12.67 seconds.

•Bishop Kearney's Kevin Goode placed 13th in the boys' long jump with a leap of 20 feet, 1 1/4 inches.

•Nazareth Academy's Karen Scozzafava performed the 1,600 leg of the girls' inter-sectional relay, which placed eighth in 12:57.3. Additional relay members included Spencerport's Tammy Bush, Canandaigua's Kim Giese and Hornell's Laura Shults.

•BK's Patrick Goode advanced to the semifinal qualifying heat for the boys' 100 before being eliminated. He also competed in the 200 but was knocked out in the first qualifying heat.

## Teegardin places fourth at golf championships

McQuaid Jesuit golfer Randy Teegardin closed out his spring season in style, placing fourth in the New York State Public High School Athletic Association championships. The event took place June 4-5 at Cornell University Golf Course.

Teegardin shot a spectacular final round of 73 for a two-day total of 151. His stellar play enabled him to move up nine spots from his 13th-place position after an opening round 78.

Teegardin's finish left him five strokes behind medalist Jeff Turton of Ithaca. McQuaid's other representative at the state tourney, Kevin Haefner, posted rounds of 83 and 82 to finish at 165.
