"Will you destroy them if there are thirty people?"


"For thirty people, I will spare the city."

### **Bible Accent**


The ancient Israelites based their calendar on a seven-day week and a month of approximately thirty days. The days were referred to by number, except for the seventh day, which was called the Sabbath. Sabbath means 'rest," and is in honor of the seventh day of creation, when God rested. The moon and the sun were important reference points in this calendar. Many important holidays fell on the time of the full moon, such as Passover and the Feast of Tabernacles. The spring and winter solar equinoxes were considered new year's days. As early as the time of the Babylonian empire, a year consisted of twelve months. Four of those months had names of Israelite origin, and the others were given Babylonian names. Thousands of years later, the Romans created their own calendar. It is that calendar which is the foundation of the one we use today.
