"Do not be afraid," the angel said. "God has seen your faithfulness. Your wife will soon bear a son. He will be full of the Holy Spirit."


"How can this be possible?" my father asked. "I am now old."


2. What did John say when he saw Jesus waiting to be baptized?

Baptism is one of the Sacraments of Initiation. The symbolism of purification by water dates back to the priests of the Old Testament who had to bathe before they offered sacrifices. In the New Testament, John's ministry of baptism is mentioned in all four of the Gospels. John's message was that baptism was a means of repentance and entrance into the kingdom of heaven.

According to the Book of the Acts, the apostles also baptized new members of the Christian community. Today, Catholic children are baptized as babies with the blessing and support of their parents and godparents. The Rite of Christian Initiation for Adults (RCIA) program offers baptism for new converts or for those who may not have received the sacraments while they were young. Mark 1:4 says, "Turn away from your sins and be baptized and God will forgive your sins."

Saint Ita

Diedre, also known as Ita, was born in the mitdle of the sixth century to aristocratic parents in the county of Waterford, Ireland.

When she became a young woman, a wealthy nobleman wanted to marry her. Diedre was deeply religious and was afraid marriage would interfere with her service to the Lord. She fasted and prayed for several days for an answer. Her father then gave permission for her to join a religious vocation, if that was what she preferred. She did and eventually founded a convent of her own and established a school for boys.

Several miracles are attributed to Diedre, including one that claims she raised a soldier killed in battle from the dead. We honor her on Jan. 15.
