# Catholics among 200,000 at D.C. rally for children

WASHINGTON (CNS) — Whether wearing T-shirts or habits, whether carrying banners or staffing information tables, Catholics made their presence known at the June 1 Stand for Children rally in Washington — and at events before and after.

The Catholics were among an estimated 200,000 people who flocked to the Lincoln Memorial that day to ask that children be put at the front of the national agenda.

Sister Mary Geraldine Yelich, assistant principal of Holy Family School in Grand Junction, Colo., was flown to the rally by her order along with two of its other sisters and one of its lay associates.

"My community thought we definitely should be represented," said the Sister of Charity of Leavenworth, who added she has worked with children all her life, including more than 45 years in religious life.

Since she entered religious life, "our society's different. The family's different," Sister Yelich said, "so our schools are different. Some of our children are needy. They need more affection.

"The climate has changed."

Davis, who teaches at Billings, Mont., Catholic Central High School and works with runaways, said the rally "is really going to make me aware of issues at the national level and the state level. I'm going to go back with a lot of fuel and energy."

Daryn Hunt, a social worker for St. Stephen's Community House in Columbus, Ohio, was part of a delegation of 10. The house serves 200 youths from 6 weeks old to 18 years old.

The activities the house offers "keeps kids off the street, keeps 'em busy," Hunt said.

Some of those activities are dependent on federal funds, which was an issue for some rally participants — especially those who stayed in Washington to lobby their representatives in Congress June 3 on children's interest legislation.

If federal funds were cut, "I don't think we'll close," Hunt said, "but we want to offer a quality program."

East of the Lincoln Memorial rally site were several tents. One was a prayer tent. One was an "interfaith" tent, where reli-

gious-based organizations offered information on pro-child activities.

Network, the national Catholic social justice lobby founded by women religious, had a booth. Sister Anne Curtis, a member of the Sisters of Mercy of Rochester and a Network associate staffing the booth, noted that among the 3,700 endorsers of Stand for Children were the Leadership Conference of Women Religious and the Sisters of Mercy.

Later that day at the rally, a video image of a huge banner proclaiming "Sisters of Mercy Stand for Children" was beamed onto the big-screen televisions flanking the Reflecting Pool.

Sister Curtis had at the ready an "Activist Update Welfare Reform" paper prepared the day before the rally, as well as a prayer for children, sized just right for rally-goers' pants or jacket pockets.

"We'd like people to know about legislation on children, especially children who are poor," she said. "A lot of people have been really interested in the debate on welfare reform."

Josephite Father Tom Frank brought

about 40 people from Our Lady of Perpetual Help Parish in Washington, where he is pastor, including children from an after-school program run by parishioner Hannah Hawkins.

"The most dangerous time for children is between 3 and 6 (p.m.). We want to stand for children and commit our own programs for them," he said. "We can also learn new ideas on what other people are doing."

At least 10 — and as many as 20 — diocesan affiliates of Catholic Charities USA made the trip from their home dioceses.

On board from each diocese were staffers, volunteers, and the people helped by Catholic Charities and the agencies it funds, according to Catholic Charities USA's Sharon Daly.

Catholics were also invited to take part in a post-rally Mass at St. Aloysius Church less than a mile north of the Capitol. The parish, too, had endorsed Stand for Children.

Daly said the homily, music and general intercessions at the Mass were to be mindful of "children before and after they are born."


