"You can't blame the fact that you killed somebody or hurt somebody on the fact that you were just a kid," Marissa Delorey commented.

She and her mother, Peggy, feel that teens should be held fully accountable if they cause death through drinking and driving.

"Someone made a choice, and someone died because of that choice," said Peggy Delorey, who serves as the Rochester area's DWI victim advocate and coordinator of the National Council on Alcohol and Drug Depen-

dence. She added that parents must denounce not only drinking and driving, but also teen drinking in general.

"It always blows my mind when parents say, 'Oh, it's okay, my kids have a designated driver.' If you're under 21 and drinking, you're breaking the law," Peggy Delorey pointed out.

Maureen makes a plea for teens and their parents not to view alcohol use as a

rite of passage into adulthood.

"I never see a person throwing up on the front lawn and someone saying, 'Oh, you're so cool,'" Maureen remarked. "Or a parent at the morgue saying, 'Well, damn, my kid's dead — but they sure can hold their liquor.' That's never going to happen."

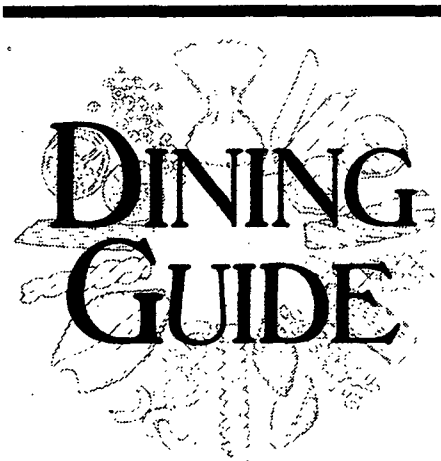

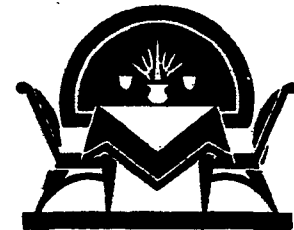
