Cyrus frees the Israelites

These are the words of God as given to his prophet, Isaiah:

"Jerusalem will again be a place in which my people live. Cities will be rebuilt out of the rubble and my temple will once again be a house of prayer. I have chosen Cyrus to rule in my place. He will give the commands that will make all of this come true."

Cyrus had led his armies against the Babylonians and had defeated them. The God of the Israelite people who had been held as captives in Babylon spoke to Cyrus-through the prophets.

On a day of rejoicing over his victory, Cyrus stood in front of the Israelites and said, "Today is for celebrating more than a victory. Today will also be a day of freedom to many who have never known it."

The crowd became silent as they waited for Cyrus to explain what he was talking about.

"The prophet Jeremiah said that his people would be held captive in Babylon for seventy years," King Cyrus said. "That time has come to an end. The God of Israel has told me what to do. The first thing I will do is to release all of you from your bondage. You are now a free people, the people of Israel, the people of your God."

Men, women and children cried, hugged each other and shouted praises to God. They were free. They could return to the country of their parents and grandparents. They could start lives of their own in freedom. Cyrus and his soldiers could celebrate their victory over Babylon, but the people of Israel would celebrate their new freedom. Just as they had once been freed from Egypt, now

they had been freed from Babylon.

One of the Israelite elders stood and motioned for silence. He opened an old scroll and read from it.

The prophet Jeremiah said, 'When the 70 years of Babylon have come to an end, the Lord will bring his people back home.' That day is today. Let us rejoice and give thanks to him."

The people shouted praises again. Musicians played harps and cymbals. Children started singing and the adults joined in. Fires were started in preparation for a feast.

After celebrating, everyone gathered their families and their possessions together, and began the march to
