The dangers of being caught up in escalating conflict hit a little too close to home for Alicia Rathbun last year.

In November 1995, Alicia's 18-year-old cousin, Jeremiah Cade, was shot and killed. According to Alicia, the shooting occurred as the result of an argument between Jeremiah and a stranger he encountered in his neighborhood. That person, she said, was eventually convicted of manslaughter.

Alicia, 16, is perplexed about how quickly a conflict could develop into such a tragedy.

"I could see getting into an argument with someone you don't like, but stupid

stuff like that I don't understand," said Alicia, a parishoner at Eastside Catholic Church in Elmira. "Jeremiah was such a good guy. The police even told my aunt what a great guy he was."

Although Steve Graves never faced such an extreme level of violence, he experienced enough conflict earlier in his life that he feared he would someday cross the line.

"In the past, I've been known to be very volatile. I'd take the easy way out instead of trying to solve the problem peacefully. A lot of conflicts I got into, there was no point in them," said Steve, 17, from Holy Cross Church in Rochester.
