Although we cannot publish every letter we receive, we seek, insofar as possible, to provide a balanced representation of expressed opinions and a variety of reflections on life in the church. We will choose letters for publication based on likely reader interest, timeliness and a sense of fair play. Our discerning readers may determine whether to agree or disagree with the letter writers' opinions.

Letters must not exceed 500 words. Anonymous letters and the use of pseudonyms are unacceptable. We reserve the right to edit letters for legal and other concerns. With respect to errors in submitted text, we will correct spelling only.

Decries vitriol of letters in Courier

To the editors:

I am writing because I am concerned about the numerous acrimonious letters to the editor that have been published recently.

I belong to a few news groups and mailing lists on the Internet, all of which have editorial policies regarding what is known as "flaming" — a blatant, unintelligent and vitriolic attack on another person's character or opinion. The reason "flaming" is prohibited is to foster a space where intelligent and civil discussion can occur on what are, sometimes, emotionally charged issues. It has been the experience of those who run these news groups and mail listings that "flaming" promotes more "flaming." On a mailing list with no editorial controls, dialogue quickly devolves to the point where the intelligent and rational cancel their subscriptions.

Since I have been receiving the *Courier* I have seen more "flaming" in the editorial page than I have ever seen on-line. Truth be known, I don't belong to any Catholic or Christian news groups or mail listings. However, even these secular news group conversations are much more civil and intelligent — let alone Christian — than those published in the *Courier*. I fear that without more stringent editorial control the *Courier's* editorial page will become more of a venue for empty vitriol than a space for readers to thoughtfully express their concerns.

Although there are many good examples of "flaming" on any given editorial page, I will focus on a letter published the week of Feb. 20 titled "Name change due?" Not much needs to be argued here. The author of this letter does not even express an identifiable opinion. This is simple grade-school name calling, which

does not warrant an audience in a publication such as the *Courier*. Publishing this kind of empty emoting promotes the evacuation of our public discussion of theological issues.

Additionally, the publication on the editorial page of defamatory comments relating to your columnists is offensive. People who write such letters should be encouraged to rewrite their letters taking issue with the ideas of the author while eschewing rancorous personal attacks. If these people find themselves incapable of controlling their antagonism, then the editors would do us all a favor by not abusing us with their rantings.

Finally, from the perspective of someone who holds a Ph.D. in Moral Theology, the tenor of the discussions — if hostile attacks can be named such — in the editorial page leads to the dumbing down of the average Catholic. More importantly, I believe hostility also leads us all to a hardening of the heart. It trains us to react rather than listen to what others have to say. We, therefore, become deaf to any opinion other than our own, forfeiting the possibility of being challenged by a fellow Christian, or even hearing God's prophetic Word.

It is an indictment of the current state of affairs in the Catholic community that secular news groups on the Internet can create a space for civil and intelligent conversation, while our Catholic publications strain to find reasonable and charitable voices from which to choose.
