In your letter to me, you asked about the Holy Spirit. I will try to explain. There was a time when you were not following God, but you were lost in idolatry. Anyone who is still leading that way of life will be unable to praise God from his heart. It is the Holy Spirit that makes it possible for us to tell others that Jesus is the Lord.

Now God has only one spirit, but that spirit has many gifts to share with us. There is only one God to serve, but we may not all serve him in the same way. God gives each of us different talents and abilities so that we may join together to meet the needs of each other and to be able to show love to those who do not know God.

One person may receive wisdom. Another may be given a special knowledge. The same spirit has given both gifts in order for us to glorify God. Faith may be given in great measure to one person, and the ability to heal or perform miracles to someone else.

If God has a message for his people, he may use one of us to declare it. Sometimes messages come to us in sounds or languages we do not understand, so God may provide someone else with the ability to interpret what was said. Yet another person may be able to tell the presence of God's spirit from the presence of a lying spirit that pretends to be from God, but is not.

And again it is the one spirit that gives all gifts to all people. There are not individual spirits for every gift. That would only lead to confusion.


## St. Matthias




The method for choosing was the casting of lots, an ancient custom of placing small bits of wood or stone in a lap or vase to represent the possible choices.


