Six to become deacons June 7 at Sacred Heart

Bishop Matthew H. Clark will ordain six men to the diaconate at 10:30 a.m. Saturday, June 7, in Sacred Heart Cathedral, Rochester.

Four of the men will be ordained permanent deacons, and the other two will be ordained transitional deacons in preparation for ordination to the priesthood.

The four men slated to be ordained permanent deacons are David A. Cadregari, 39; Robert W. Schrader, 65; Tom Phillips, 63; and Hoc Thai Nguyen, 56.

The two men who will be ordained transitional deacons are Timothy L. Niven, 35, who will be ordained a diocesan priest in 1998, and Timothy J. Fitzgerald, 32, who will be ordained a Basilian priest in September.

Cadregari and his wife, Rebecca, have two children, and are members of St. John the Evangelist Church in Spencerport. He works as a computer systems engineer at Eastman Kodak Company and is a 1980 graduate of St. John Fisher College.

As part of his training to become a deacon, Cadregari said, he did field work in a family camp and in AIDS ministry. He hopes to be assigned to St. Ambrose Church in Irondequoit.

"It increases my ability to offer service to the church," he said of the diaconate.

Schrader is a retired Kodak engineer, who has one daughter with his wife, Barbara. A parishioner at Our Lady of Lourdes Church in Brighton, Schrader said he did his diaconate training field work at a mental health center, and that he wants to continue such work, after ordination, at the Rochester Psychiatric Center.

Schrader said he was inspired to become a deacon by his friend, Deacon Bob Solan of Our Lady of Mercy Church in Greece, who died in 1995. Solan was a coworker of Schrader's at Kodak.

"I was interested in service," Schrader said. "He really encouraged me."

Phillips, a parishioner at St. Christo-

pher's Church in Chili, has five children with his wife, Barb. As part of his field work during his deacon training, he said, he worked at a soup kitchen, a children's center and in prison ministry.

A retired Kodak research technician, Phillips is a marathon runner as well as coordinator of the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults at St. Christopher's. He said he hopes to be assigned to his parish, where he has also worked with the summer vacation Bible study program.

Phillips said he was inspired to become a deacon when he was considering what to do in his retirement.

"I'm sure the Lord moved me in that direction," he said. "I said 'Lord, this is where you want me,' and took these steps."

Nguyen and his wife, Tho Thi, have five children, and attend St. Jerome's Church in East Rochester. A native of Vietnam, Nguyen came to the United States in 1975, and currently works as a machine operator at Thompson Legal Publishing.


Nguyen said he has worked in liturgical ministry at St. Anthony of Padua Church in Rochester, and hopes to continue such work with Vietnamese Catholics following ordination.

"I want to bring the Gospel to more people," he said.

Niven is pursuing a master's in divinity degree from Theological College at The Catholic University of America in Washington, D.C.

Niven will finish his studies next year, and noted that he will serve as a transitional deacon at St. Michael the Archangel Church in Silver Spring, Md., while attending school. This summer, he's working at Most Precious Blood Church in Greece, visiting the parish's sick and homebound, he said.

Fitzgerald currently works at Christ the King Parish in Irondequoit. A native of Hartford, Conn., Fitzgerald has a master's degree in theology, and taught Catholic high school in Toronto. He will be ordained this September in Hartford, he said.
