Woman spreads cheer through her community

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WAVERLY - If residents of this Tioga County village haven't bumped into Mary Schmieg lately, chances are they don't get out very much.

Schmieg covers the Waverly area, and beyond, with her goodwill activities. Although she just turned 80 years old on Sept. 25, Schmieg enjoys keeping a full

"Thank God she does have good health, because she's needed by a lot of people," remarked Doris Sindoni, a close friend.

Schmieg has transported Sindoni to and from weekday Mass at St. James Church for the past five years, after Sindoni's declining health prevented her from driving any longer.

"She's the one who keeps me going," said Sindoni, who is blind in one eye and walks with difficulty. "If I say, 'I can't get up today,' she'll say, 'Oh, yes you can."

Schmieg's busy day often begins by attending 8:30 a.m. Mass with Sindoni at St. James, where they are parishioners. The only exception is on Wednesdays, when Schmieg goes for perpetual adoration at Church of the Epiphany in Sayre, Pa., just south of Waverly.

After Mass, the two friends frequently go out for breakfast at various eateries in the village. Schmieg also spends many mornings taking people who can't drive, such as Sindoni, shopping; and buying groceries for shut-ins.

And on days that Sindoni is not feeling well, Schmieg dutifully shows up with groceries at her home.

"She seems to know what I want before I ask for it," Sindoni remarked. "She'll say, 'I thought you might need this, so I bought it' - and she's right."

Schmieg's volunteer work among Waverly residents also includes visiting hospitals and nursing homes, and assisting with the local Meals on Wheels program.

In addition, Schmieg drives to Elmira Correctional Facility every Thursday to take part in Bible study. Her buoyant attitude is evident when she speaks about her efforts to spread spirituality to inmates.

"It's wonderful if they retain it when they get out. Hopefully, some of them

According to Father Thomas Watts, pastor of James, Schmieg's cheerful outlook inspires all who come in contact with her.


"Mary is always positive. Last February, everybody would be moaning and groan-

ing about the weather and she'd say, 'Oh, that's all right.' She got me through the winter," Father Watts said with a laugh.

Most of Schmieg's efforts are conducted behind the scenes, Sindoni observed.

"She doesn't put on a show for anyone. She's so down to earth," Sindoni commented.

Indeed, Schmieg said she gets uncom-

"The Lord came into my life. It was just wonderful," Schmieg recalled. "I knew he had been up there, but I didn't feel that closeness until then."

Schmieg does allow herself leisure time. After taking an afternoon nap, she

"I love to play cards," Schmieg said.

Schmieg's list of friends and well-wishers is so lengthy, she added, that her birthday observance was spread out over several weeks.

"I've been celebrating since August. I just got a card yesterday," Schmieg remarked in an October interview.

And the daily "family" Schmieg has acquired at St. James continues to sing her praises all year long.

"She's just been loved by everybody," Sindoni commented.
