For at least the sixth straight year, youths from St. Anne Parish, Rochester, took part in an Advent service project at the Rochester Ronald McDonald House. About 13 youths visited the facility Saturday. Nov. 22, to prepare and serve spaghetti and meatballs to families staying at the house.

The big yellow house near Strong Memorial Hospital provides temporary lodging for families who have members, from young to old, receiving medical treatment at nearby hospitals.

According to Alice Leistman, religious-education coordinator at St. Anne, parish youths jump at the chance to volunteer for this project.

"The biggest thing is just the idea they help people, even though they may not meet them directly. It gives them satisfaction," Leistman said.

She added that the event become so popular that St. Anne has now begun visiting Ronald McDonald House during the Lenten season as well. While she had to limit the number of teens helping this month, others who volunteered are already scheduled for March 14.

Chris Robbins, 15, helped with meal preparation Nov. 22 and also added dinner music - he played Christmas songs, show tunes and other melodies on the piano.

The guests who stay there really appreciate it. It makes them feel a little better for what they're going through," Chris said.

"Oh, I was never so well taken care of in my life," one woman exclaimed to Leistman.
