Matthew's Gospel lists the genealogical history between David and Jesus.

According to these records, Joseph was a direct descendant of David. Other records indicate that Mary was from the tribe of Judah and that she was also a descendant of David. Mary was also related to Elizabeth, who was the mother of John the Baptist.

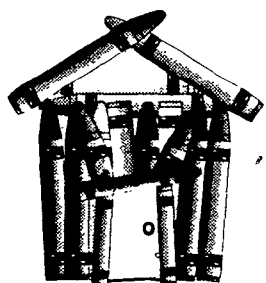
Mary was chosen by God to be the mother of his only son, Jesus. Jesus was not born in the luxury of a palace, but in the stable behind an inn, hardly the place anyone expected the promised messiah to be born.

St. John of the Cross

St. John of the Cross was born in 1542, the son of a weaver, who died when St. John was young. His mother raised her three children in near poverty. St. John was forced to work in a hospital to try to help feed the family. He was able to attend a Jesuit college and became first a Carmelite friar and eventually an ordained priest.

A division developed within the Carmelites and St. John was ordered to give up the position he held as spiritual director of a convent. He would not resign and was taken out by force, beaten and thrown into a jail cell. He escaped and was able to remain free until the division of the order had been resolved by forming a new order.

St. John is recognized as a mystic, poet and scholar, and is honored as a doctor of the church. We remember him on Dec. 14.
