I encourage you to do that because I believe it is in knowing Christ that we come to know our God and to have a deeper sense of the dignity of all human


How we go about such contemplation will vary according to our personalities, experience, responsibilities and the circumstances of our lives.

The ill or the homeless or the unemployed and those who walk with them might find encouragement in the utter poverty of the Christ child, and the vulthe way



nerability and insecurity that accompany poverty.

However you may choose to open your heart to the great Feast of Christmas, I hope you will be unafraid to trust the Lord with whatever you identify in yourself as frail, vulnerable or unredeemed.

Central to the great beauty of the Christmas Feast is its message that Jesus understands the human condition because he has been through it all. I should rather say that he knows your heart and mine beyond our understanding, and loves us deeply no matter what we may think of ourselves. Christ's love for us is that real, that human, that personal, that enduring.

Christmas reminds us in healthy ways that our God, while a God of great power and majesty, chooses to be near us in intimate relationship. God comes

to us in the daily and the ordinary, even in the disorganized and unwelcome aspects of life.

That is a great consolation to me. I hope it is to you. Christmas says that we do not need to retreat from the daily, concrete challenges of life to find God. This great feast says rather that God is in all of it, sustaining us and calling us to new life.

My Christmas schedule will be the same as it has been since I began my ministry as bishop. I will be celebrating with the community at Sacred Heart Cathedral at midnight, and with the prisoners at the Monroe County Jail on Christmas morning.

Following the liturgy at the jail I will be going to the home of my sister and brother-in-law for dinner. An added bonus this year will be the companionship of my niece, Grace, who will come by train to visit on December 23 and drive back to Waterford with me on Christmas day. Margaret did the same thing last year. As you know, I delight in their friendship and all of the excitement they bring to life.

Once again I wish you great joy at Christmas.
