Fr. Robert Miller; taught philosophy

Father Robert Grace Miller, CSB, a Rochester native who served in the diocese a number of years, died Dec. 21, 1997, at Providence Centre near Toronto, following a long illness. He was 85.

Born to the late William and Margaret (Nelligan) Miller in Rochester, Father Miller graduated from Nazareth Hall and Aquinas Institute. He received his bachelor's and master's degrees from the University of Toronto, and his Ph.D., under the direction of Etienne Gilson, from the Institute of Medieval Studies in Toronto.

Father Miller entered the Basilian Fathers in 1938 and was ordained Aug. 15, 1943. He served in Rochester, Houston, Saskatoon, Toronto and Windsor, teaching and writing.

"He was always a person of great detail and precision," stated his brother, Father Thomas Miller, CSB, of Rochester, "no doubt the product of his intensive studies and attention to distinctions so necessary to avoid error and to be faithful to Catholic teachings and to the teachings of St. Thomas Aquinas and to Thomas' men-



tor, St. Albert the Great."

"Even though his vision was poor here, he had the beatific vision," he added, explaining Fa-

ther Miller had suffered progressive eye problems.

Father Miller taught philosophy at the University of Toronto; University of Saskatchewan; University of St. Thomas in Houston, where he also was chair of the philosophy department; University of Toronto; and University of Windsor.

Father Miller moved back to Rochester in 1959 to help his parents during their declining years, his brother said. He chaired the philosophy department at St. John Fisher College, 1959-69, and taught at Fisher until 1977. He assisted at Sacred Heart Cathedral for two years before becoming adjunct professor of philosophy

at Nazareth College, 1978-88.

His writings included two books and numerous articles in various scholarly publications, The New Catholic Encyclopedia and the Encyclopedia of Philosophy.

He was associate editor of *The New Scholasticism* 1956-63; executive committee chairman, Canadian Philosophy Association 1953-55; executive council member, American Catholic Philosophy Association 1960-64; and editor, Canadian Priests' Magazine 1944-48.

"Bob used to tell me that 'Eaten bread is soon forgotten' and that few people are interested in one's accomplishments," his brother said in his funeral sermon. "This is so true. God and Father Bob know what dedication and hard work went into his many many contributions to the world's Catholic philosophical knowledge."

The priest was predeceased by his brothers David, John and Father Richard Miller, SJ.

His funeral Mass was celebrated Dec. 23 in Cardinal Flahiff Basilian Centre, Toronto. Interment was in Holy Cross Cemetery, Thornhill, Ontario.

New name, Auburn site for ministry

"It is much bigger, much brighter much cleaner, you name it," said Harriet Barone, the Auburn office's secretary, it also


