

"If you're happy with yourself and your situation, it's all the better," Sarah said.

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For the time being, though, Nik 'Hall said that marriage is one of the furthest thoughts from his mind.

"Marriage is not something I put high on my list of priorities right now. It's not a very important issue in high school;

I think what's more important is thinking about getting good grades and getting into college,"

said Nik, 15, from Elmira's Eastside Parish. He's a sophomore at Elmira Notre Dame High School.

On the other hand, marriage is a very current topic for a couple in Rochester's 19th Ward youth group. Carla Logan, 18, and John Zynda, 16, have been dating since the summer of 1996. Although they may not get married for at least a couple of years, they emphasized that they plan to be together for life.

John, still in his junior year at Aquinas Institute, said he's certain of his feelings toward Carla.

"We started getting closer and closer, and I thought, this is the person I want to spend the rest of my life with," John said. "I'm totally prepared to get married now, but I think it's best to wait until I at least finish high school and we could afford to live together."

Carla, also, feels comfortable about the possibility of marriage in her near future.
