The priests and pastoral administrators of our diocese will be gathering in Corning this afternoon for our annual convocation. I always look forward to this event. This year is no exception.

Our gathering theme will be freedom, and we shall explore ways in which we can grow in freedom as human persons. That is a constructive goal, of course. Our pastoral leaders make it the more attractive by relating it to their capacity to serve you in the most fruitful way possible.

In other words, our hope is that if we can grow in freedom, we will be better able to serve your growth toward greater Christian maturity and peace of heart.

My tasks are to offer the keynote address, and to preside and preach at Wednesday's concluding prayer service. During that service, our priests will renew their priestly commitments.

raises up other realities and prac-



tices that nourish us in ministry; and

 makes some suggestions — which: may not solve all our problems - but will strengthen us to face them with peaceful heart and optimistic spirit.

Father David Reid, SSCC, former pastor of Ss. Peter and Paul Church, Rochester, will be our guest speaker. David is a biblical scholar and a person of considerable and varied pastoral experience. Currently, he serves as a pastor in the Diocese of Fall River, Massachusetts.

David entitles his talk, "Liberating Our Gifts to Liberate the Gifts of God's People." I look forward to hearing him. But David's commitment to us does not end with his talk. He will engage in conversation with the assembly following his address.

In addition, David will lead our concluding session by reflecting with us on the signs of freedom and hope he will have noted during our convocation experience.

Four workshops complete the program. They will touch on some important themes: vocation, spirituality of the diocesan priest, retirement issues, and time and resource management in service of mission.

These activities will engage much of our attention during our stay in Corning. But our planning committee has tried hard to honor our priests' request that the session not be all work and no play.

Our last two convocations presented heavy workloads. Participants responded with great generosity on both occasions, but they made it clear that opportunities to relax and pray together, to renew old friendships and begin new ones are very important values to us all.

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The schedule our committee prepared indicates to me that they have done an excellent job of responding to the input they received.

By the time you read this, we will have returned from convocation to daily ministry. You can be very sure that you were very close to us during our time together.

The goodness of people is one of the great joys of pastoral ministry, so you came up a lot in conversation and you are always in our prayers.
