not just because of the amusement it brought. I comment on it also because it illustrates the possible down side of a great opportunity that presents itself to our faith community. I refer to the increased use of computer and communications technology to strengthen our community and to advance our common mission. The advice of experts, what I see every day in a variety of fields, the way our kids are trained, all convince me that we will be left far behind if we do not make a serious investment of time, energy and money in this field.

We simply cannot afford to fall too far behind in this regard. To do so would be to weaken our capacity to interact within our faith community in some very important ways. I am afraid that it would also weaken our ability to engage in a credible dialogue with the culture in which we find ourselves. Both would be very bad for us.

Does that seem scary to you? Or depersonalizing? Or like a distraction that, however worthy, leads us away from our main purposes? I think I can understand such concerns. My questions are not so much with the idea or the theory of it all. I am convinced that we need to move ahead in the use of technology if we are to be credible to the generations who will follow us.

My personal question is whether I will be able to learn the new set of skills I will need if I am to be able just to keep track of what will be happening. That seems intimidating to me and it will until I actually acquire the desired skills.

My pastoral question is how best this incredible technology can be used to free us for mission, foster our growth, bring us together, personalize our lives, help us to learn all through life, enable us to use our limited resources in the wisest possible way.

What do you think about the church and this kind of technology? What opportunities do you see for us? What concerns do you have? Any specific suggestions about ways in which the use of technology can help free us for the good purposes mentioned above? Any particular cautions you would raise for consideration before we go too far in this direction? Let us know what you think.
