Chinese priest released

HONG KONG (CNS) - A priest of the underground church in China was released by security officials six days after being detained for displaying an image of Jesus outside his church and playing hymns over a loudspeaker, a source said.

Father Miao Shaozeng of Fu'an Diocese, in coastal Fujian province, was allowed to return to the church in Kangcuo May 28 and resume normal activities as parish priest, without paying any fine, the source told UCA News, an Asian church news agency based in Thailand, June 12.

The source confirmed that Public Security Bureau officials had arrested Father Miao May 22 for disrupting social order.

The charge concerned his hanging a picture of Jesus from the spire of the, church and playing recorded hymns for the public to hear on Easter.

The source said Father Miao used to hang festive red cloth and play. hymns over loudspeakers during major Catholic feast days, but that officials had warned him last Christmas about hanging up the cloth outside the church. Officials did not take further action at that time.

The fact that the priest is in charge of diocesan finances might have led to the arrest, but the security officials had no evidence with which to charge him with raising funds to finance illegal activities, the source noted.

Several years ago, a former Fu'an procurator was also arrested, he said. More than a million yuan to be used by the diocese for church construction, formation and welfare services was confiscated, the source said.

Albanian bishops decry Serb attacks

VATICAN CITY - As NATO countries increased their pressure on the Serbian government to stop its offensive against ethnic Albanians in Kosovo - including a show of force by NATO jets June 15 - the bishops of Albania appealed for an end to the violence.

"We denounce every violent action against the weak, the innocent and the defenseless, from whatever side it comes," the Albanian bishops said in a statement published June 12 by the Vatican.

The bishops said violence "does nothing but increase the hatred and evil."

The exodus of children, women and the aged leads us to think that the situation is becoming increasingly alarming and aggravated," the bishops said.

The Serbian government which controls Kosovo - a province whose population is 90 percent ethnic Albanian - began a crackdown on pro-independence movements in February. The offensive escalated in late May with the Serbian army reportedly bombing villages.

An estimated 20,000 people have fled Kosovo, many of them seeking refuge in

Kosovo was an autonomous province within Serbia, a republic of Yugoslavia, until 1989, when its autonomy was revoked by Serb leader Slobodan Milosevic, now president of Yugoslavia.

On June 15, 85 NATO warplanes staged mock air raids over Albania, coming within 10 miles of the border with Kosovo. NATO officials said the maneuvers were intended to pressure Yugoslav forces to end their attacks on ethnic Albanians.

We are showing that we are willing to back up international diplomacy with military means," Javier Solana, NATO secretary-general, told reporters June 11 when plans for the air exercises were announced.

Despite the display of air power, however, there were reports of continued attacks by Serb forces in Kosovo.

The Albanian bishops' appeal included a call to their own people "to welcome our brothers and sisters in difficulty in the spirit of the Gospel of Jesus Christ who identified himself with every man."

The bishops also called on the international community to take action to ensure that "basic human rights are recognized and respected in accordance with international agreements."

The Albanian bishops closed their message with a prayer that "reason, good sense and peace" would return to the Balkans and that "the Lord would open the hearts and minds of those who have the fate of these brothers and sisters in their hands."
