The idea for an official Father's Day was originated by Mrs. John Bruce Dodd in 1909. She eventually persuaded the Ministerial Society of Spokane. Wash., to honor fathers with special church services, and the first Father's Day was celebrated in Spokane on June 19, 1910.

Mrs. Dodd's father. William Smart, was a Civil War veteran who had raised his family mostly as a single parent: His wife had died while giving birth to their sixth child.

Recognition of Father's Day reached a national level in 1916 when President Woodrow Wilson approved the idea. And in 1924, President Calvin Coolidge recommended a national observance of Father's Day. It is celebrated on the third Sunday of each June.

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
