Father Callan will serve temporarily in Elmira

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ROCHESTER – Father James B. Callan, controversial former administrator of Rochester's Corpus Christi Church, has been temporarily reassigned as a resident priest at Our Lady of Lourdes Church in Elmira.

The assignment will last between two and three months and begins Friday, Sept. 11, according to Elizabeth Brown, diocesan director of communications. No future assignment has yet been determined, Brown noted.

Meanwhile, Corpus staff members were slated to meet with diocesan officials on Wednesday, Sept. 9, to discuss the future of the parish. No priest had yet been assigned to the parish as of the *Catholic Courier's* Tuesday, Sept. 8 deadline.

Our Lady of Lourdes recently suffered the loss of its pastor, Father Paul J. Mc-Cabe, who died Aug. 25. Sister M. Raymond Joseph Griffin, RSM, pastoral associate at Our Lady of Lourdes, is currently serving as the parish's temporary administrator.

Sister Griffin said the parish would welcome Father Callan despite the recent turmoil over his removal from Corpus by Bishop Matthew H. Clark for public defiance of certain church laws.

"My whole approach to this is what he has done is none of our beeswax," Sister Griffin told the *Courier* in a phone interview from Elmira. "He's probably hurting, and so are we with the loss of our pastor. Maybe we can help each other."

Father McCabe had, before his sudden death, actually invited Father Callan to serve at the parish, according to both Father Callan and Sister Griffin. When it

was made public that Bishop Clark had removed Father Callan from Corpus Christi, Father Callan said Father McCabe called him and told him he was welcome to fulfill any temporary reassignment at Our Lady of Lourdes.

Father Callan's reassignment to Elmira comes following his removal last month from Corpus Christi by Bishop Clark. The bishop has cited the priest's ongoing defiance of church law regarding women's liturgical roles, ministry to homosexuals and intercommunion with non-Catholics to justify removing him.

In public statements, Father Callan has claimed the Vatican pressured the bishop to remove him, but Bishop Clark has maintained the decision was solely his own.

Father Callan, administrator of Corpus for 22 years, said goodbye to his parishioners at crowded weekend Masses on Saturday, Sept. 5 and Sept. 6. Prior to his final 11:30 a.m. Sunday Mass as administrator of the church, Father Callan told the *Courier* his mood was upbeat.

"I'm feeling buoyed up by the spirit of the congregation because they're definitely committed to end discrimination in our church," he said.

During his homily at the 11:30 a.m. Mass, Father Callan reiterated his belief in the stands that got him in trouble in the first place, but insisted he was still loyal to Rome.

"The pope is my father," Father Callan said. "However, there is a blind spot in the Vatican. There is discrimination, and where there is discrimination, you can't be silent."

Rochester Mayor William A. Johnson, Jr., made an appearance at the 11:30 a.m. Mass to express his gratitude to Father Callan and the parish for its outreach work in the city.

"Without this church, I don't know where we would be in this community because you fill so many voids," Johnson said.

The mayor added that he did not want to involve himself in a Catholic Church dispute.

"I find myself torn because there are no two people I respect more than Jim Callan and Matt Clark," the mayor said of the priest and the bishop.

A standing ovation greeted the mayor when he said, "Wherever they send you, Jim, give 'em hell!"

After Mass, Mary Ramerman, pastoral associate at Corpus, said the diocese had. not yet told her or any parish staff members what modifications they must make to conform with church law. On Sunday, Ramerman held up the chalice during the consecration, and wore a half-stole – which she referred to as a "banner" – that was given to her by the parish on her alb. Both practices were among those that Father Callan has claimed drew the Vatican's attention to Corpus Christi.

Ramerman told the *Courier* that she held firm in her position that she would not remove the banner.

"I don't know how that would happen without saying to women 'You're not valuable," she said.


