The most numerous accounts of angels are in the Book of Revelation. The angels John writes about in his account are seen worshiping and praising God, delivering messages, carrying out God's instructions, or watching as events unfold on the Earth.

St. Ignatius

Historians believe that St. Ignatius persecuted Christians in the first century before he became a Christian himself. He became the pastor of the early church at Antioch and some accounts say he was appointed as bishop by St. Peter himself.

During a later time of Christian persecution, St. Ignatius was arrested by Roman soldiers and imprisoned on a ship bound for Rome. He made a friend of one of the jailers and he was able to write letters to the people in the churches who were concerned about his welfare and who were praying for him. St. Ignatius knew he would be killed once he reached Rome, but he preached whenever he was allowed off the ship when it stopped at ports along the way.

St. Ignatius became a martyr in Rome in the year 107. We remember him on Oct. 17.


