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

Rochester takes the lead

There's an old saying that you can lead a horse to water, but you can't make it drink.

Among catechetical leaders, a related question might be: You can invite a catechist to ongoing formation, but how do you make him or her

The question may arise more frequently, as the state's bishops are issuing a new plan for catechist formation and the Diocese of Rochester has stepped up its offerings.

Roberta Kukiela, catechetical leader at St. Hyacinth Parish, Auburn, came up with her own means of encouragement: Provide them with a picnic lunch.

"Because they serve our parish, I wanted to serve them in turn," explained Kukiela. "You have to treat them like gold."

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
