"What will you do now?" the man

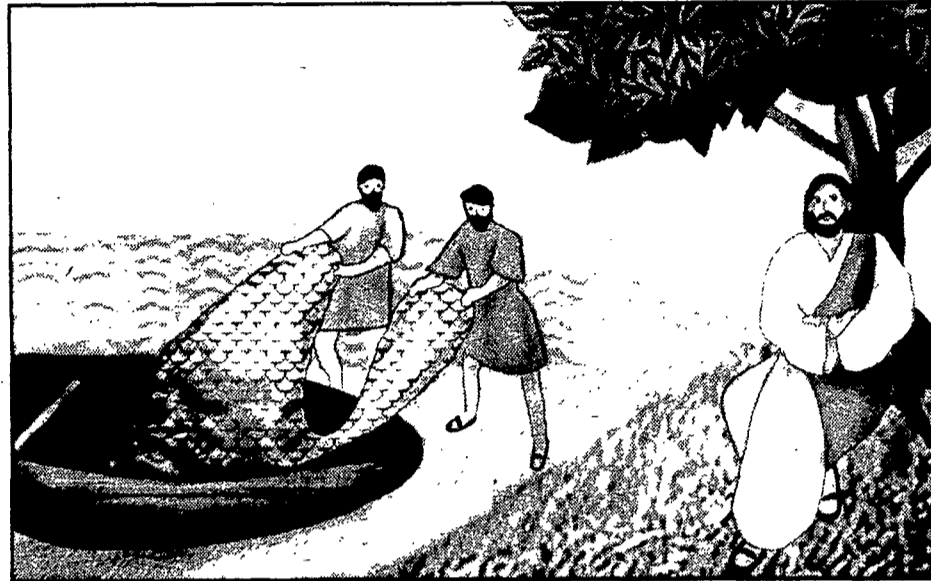

Bible Accent

There are many animals that appear regularly in the Bible. These animals were important to the people of Israel and their neighbors.

Camels: Because camels are able to carry heavy loads while requiring little food or water, they became a valuable working animal to desert dwellers.

Donkeys: These sturdy animals were able to carry light loads, but they were also able to carry riders, so they were an important alternative to walking.

Horses: Horses were expensive and were therefore owned only by wealthy people and kings. They were commonly found in battles being ridden by soldiers.

Cows and bulls: These animals were used to plow the fields and to provide a source of meat and milk as well as goods made from their hides.

Sheep: Sheep provided wool, milk and cheese.

Lions, leopards and bears were dangerous animals that lived in the wilds of the Bible lands.

St. Angela Merici

St. Angela Merici was born in Italy in the late 15th century. Her parents died when she was young, then her sister died without receiving the sacraments. An angel appeared to St. Angela, assuring her her sister was loved by the Lord.

When she was still a young teenager, St. Angela joined the Secular Franciscans and became a teacher. She eventually built her own school with the help of a rich patron. A later vision of young women climbing to heaven on a ladder led St. Angela to found her own order, following the example of St. Ursula. St. Angela's followers usually wore black and spent most of their time caring for the sick or teaching religious education, especially to girls.

The Ursulines were not officially recognized by the pope until after St. Angela's death in 1540. We honor her on Jan. 27.
