Obituaries

Father James F. O'Connell, 89; pastor and counselor

Father James F. O'Connell, 89, died April 1, 1999, from respiratory failure. Hehad been ill for about a year.

"It was quite fitting he died on Holy Thursday, the night of the Eucharist, the Lord's Supper," said his brother, Father Richard C. O'Connell of Rochester. "He loved people, and he loved being a priest, and he loved the Eucharist.'

Father O'Connell concelebrated daily Mass at St. Ann's Home, where he lived, until the week of his death.

Born in New York City, Father O'Connell was ordained in 1936 by Bishop Edward Mooney in St. Patrick's Cathedral, Rochester. Father O'Connell served as assistant pastor at the cathedral (1936-40), and at St. Lucy Church, Rochester (1940-53). In 1953 he became pastor of Church of the Epiphany, Sodus, also overseeing St. Rose in Sodus Point, St. Mary Magdalene in Wolcott, and St. John Fisher, East Bay. He began serving as pastor of St. Mary of the Lake, Ontario, in 1956, and of St. Mary's Church, Waterloo, in 1959.

While in Waterloo, he oversaw the building of a new convent and new rectory, as well as a grade school that was designed by his brother Paul.

He was assistant pastor at St. Mary's Church, Bath, from 1975 until retiring in 1980. He remained an active priest-in-residence at St. Cecilia's, Elmira, 1982-87; Our Lady of Good Counsel, Rochester, 1988-91; and at Holy Trinity Church, Webster, 1991-95.

"Several people of the parish were wonderful to him; they helped extend his vocation five or six years," commented his nephew Tom O'Connell, a Holy Trinity parishioner. Parishioners helped the priest organize and type his homilies, and drove him places, he said.

Father O'Connell was the second oldest of nine children. His brother Father Richard O'Connell recalled the priest's visits back to his Clifton Springs home to see him-and his twin brother Robert, both 16 years younger.

We thought we had died and gone to heaven when he came to visit. He'd take us on (car) rides ... he'd take us to Victor for ice cream and Canandaigua for swimming and bumpy cars," he said.

Both he and his nephew noted Father O'Connell's gift of counseling.

"When (family members) had troubles they'd go to Uncle Jim. ... He'd give you things to think about," Tom O'Connell noted. People sought out his friendship and his counsel."

He also made his family his recreation, Tom O'Connell said. "He was very encouraging, celebrating our little tri-

umphs. Father O'Connell is survived by Father Richard O'Connell and another brother, Paul (Ann) of Tallahassee, Fla.; and many nephews, nieces and other relatives in the United States and Ireland. He was predeceased by his parents, James and Johanna O'Connell; sister, Mary Beurmann; and brothers, John, Edward, Thomas, Francis and Robert.

Father Richard O'Connell gave the homily at a vigil Mass April 6. Bishop Matthew H. Clark was to preside at a funeral Mass April 7, with Father Thomas Nellis, pastor of Holy Trinity, giving the homily. Both services were at Holy Trinity, where interment also was planned. The family asked that Masses be offered in Father O'Connell's remembrance.

Sister St. Edward Lannon, SSJ; 88

 Sister St. Edward Lannon, SSJ, a veteran nurse, died at the St. Joseph Convent Infirmary on March 20, 1999. She was 88.

Sister St. Edward was a native of Susquehanna, Pa., and entered the Sisters of St. Joseph of Rochester in 1932. She graduated from St. Joseph's Hospital School of Nursing, Elmira, and then worked in her order's infirmary for eight

In the course of her career, she also worked for four years at St. Joseph's Villa in Greece; two years at St. Ann's Home in Rochester; and for 44 years at St. Joseph's Hospital where, for more than two decades, she served as a surgery and medical supervisor.

While at St. Joseph's, she also supervised health care, served as an apostolic visitor to patients, and oversaw employ-ees' health care.

Among Sister St. Edward's favorite memories were those of helping people with difficult spiritual, emotional or physical problems, according to a statement from her order. Additionally, her order said Sister St. Edward "was a stickler for detail in the care of patients but was always ready to help anyone in need."

Sister St. Edward is survived by one brother, Henry (Geraldine) of Hollywood, Fla.; one sister-in-law, Jacqueline Lannon of Chicago; a nephew, nieces and cousins as well as her fellow Sisters of St. Joseph.
