## Rural life keeps country church's members together

Parish Profile St. Bridget's, St. Joseph's, East Bloomfield

EAST BLOOMFIELD - When he retires, Father John J. Philipps will finally be able to tell his parishioners at St. Bridget's and St. Joseph's Church what he really thinks of them.

To the sorrow of the scandal-hungry, however, the priest seems to hold a high opinion of his flock.

"I think you would find it a welcoming parish," he said of his church. "I've enjoyed it because it's small and, after a few years, you can stand up there any Sunday and know their first names."

Father Philipps will celebrate his retirement at the 11 a.m. Mass Sunday, June 27, followed by an outdoor reception on parish grounds. Sam Orlando, a retired schoolteacher who attends St. Bridget's and St. Joseph's with his wife, Dianna, said Father Philipps will be missed at the parish.

"He talks straight to the people," he said. "He loves kids, and I think ... he's just an honest, nice guy.'

Father Philipps will be leaving one of the oldest parishes in the diocese, St. Bridget's, which was founded by Irish immigrants in 1850. Its neighboring parish, St. Joseph's, was founded as a mission of St. Bridget's in 1856. But declining membership forced St. Joseph's to close its doors in 1990 and its congregation merged with that of St. Bridget's.



"There's a lack of cliques," he said. "I like the fact that people do get along."

The parish is also bound together by its approach to catechesis, according to Deacon Claude Lester, who's a staff member. Deacon Lester said St. Bridget's and St. Joseph's emphasizes making an entire family – and not just individual members – learn about the Catholic faith together through its religious education program.

"Faith is caught, not taught," Deacon Lester commented of the parish's approach to catechesis. "Parents are the key element. We're really giving them support to have (family) conversations around the common element of faith."

Deacon Lester added that the parish often puts its own unique twist on religious education. For example, during Lent, parishioners used tables, chairs, masking tape and other materials to create a replica of ancient Jerusalem in the parish center. This set was used to give people a physical sense of the events of Holy Week, he said.

Located in a rural area outside of Rochester, St. Bridget's and St. Joseph's draws parishioners from both East- and West Bloomfield as well as Victor, Bristol and Canandaigua, Father Philipps said. He added that about 300 families are registered at the parish.

Low-stress country living seems to keep many parishioners in the area, parish staff members said. In fact, Judie Worhacz, parish secretary, noted, "a lot of people still leave their doors unlocked at night." She added that the only time her own house was broken into was when she had locked it up.

Bob A. DeSanctis, chairman of the parish council, echoed Worhacz's sentiments about easy living in a country parish.

"A lot of people know each other, and you always get a smile and a 'hello' and that's all we need," he said.

This intimacy flows into the life of the church, according to Jim Weisbeck, chairman of the parish's finance committee.

The parish emphasizes not only creating its own life, but participation in the life of others, according to Margaret L. Ilardi, chairwoman of the 12-member social ministry committee. The church sponsors a child in El Salvador, as well as donating materials and monies to area organizations working with the homeless, the imprisoned, the hungry and women in crisis pregnancies, she said.

Another parish group that does social outreach work is Court Isabella 836, the church's chapter of Catholic Daughters of America, according to its regent, Dolores T. Rayburn. She noted that her 30-member group raises funds for seminarians and women in crisis pregnancies, and has also procured materials for an area hospice.

She added that she is never lacking for help from her fellow parishioners when it comes to needing volunteers for an outreach effort. She attributed the parish's commitment to others to its faith-filled families and friendly atmosphere.

"This parish has always made everyone feel welcome," she concluded. "Nobody's ever shut out."
