# Jesus tells a parable

When Jesus was asked about the kingdom of heaven, he often told a certain type of story called a parable to explain what he wanted to say. This is one of his parables.

So he returned to the village at 9 o'clock. There he found men in the marketplace who were willing to work in his field. But still there were not enough men. The farmer returned at noon and at 3 o'clock, and each time he hired more workers.

He returned a last time at 5 o'clock, when he found some men sitting on a bench doing nothing.

"Why are you men not working?" the farmer asked.

"Because there is no work to be found," one of them said.



"Work for me until dark," the farmer said. So the men followed him to his vineyard. The farmer was pleased because he now had enough men to pick his grapes and then they would be ready to be prepared for the market as jellies, juice, raisins and wine.

At the end of the day, the farmer told his foreman to have all of the workers line up to be paid. The first to arrive were the men who had started at 5 o'clock. Each man was paid three coins. Next were the men who had started early in the morning, and the farmer paid them three coins also. This made the

men angry. "We picked your grapes from morning until night, under the hot sun, and yet you give us the same pay as men who worked only a short time!"

The farmer replied: "When I met you this morning, we agreed on a price for your work. Is that not what I paid you? It is my choice to pay my workers what I think is fair. Are you jealous because I am a generous man? Those who are first will become the last, and those who are last will become the first."

## **Bible Accent**

Although farming was a majoroccupation of many of the people. who lived when Jesus walked the earth, there were many other trades: that contributed to the world's economy.

Metalsmiths used gold, silver and copper to make money, decorations, weapons and tools. Carpenters – like St. Joseph and Jesus – used wood for furniture, buildings and boats. Cloth makers took wool from sheep, processed it by hand and then spun and dyed it in order to make clothing.

Potters would make bowls, urns and dishes out of clay that had been formed into shapes and fired. Masons would construct buildings from limestone blocks or from bricks made out of clay or mud. And jewelers used gold, silver, or ivory, and such valuable stones as rubies, emeralds and sapphires to make items for people who could afford them.

## St. Matthew

St. Matthew's profession was no more popular with the people 2,000 years ago than it is today. He was a tax collector. He was employed by the Romans, although he was a Jew.

Jesus first met St. Matthew when he was collecting money at one of the custom houses. Jesus said only two words to him: "Follow me." St. Matthew immediately left his position to become one of the first disciples of Jesus.

When St. Matthew, other tax collectors and other guests were having dinner with Jesus, some Pharisees, who were the religious law scholars of the day, saw them and showed their displeasure for Jesus and the people who were with him...

"Why does Jesus eat with tax collectors and sinners?" they asked. St. Matthew rose above the criticism he received and remained a follower of Jesus, His name is linked with the first Gospel. We honor him on Sept. 21.
