



Obituaries Sister René McNiff, 76

Sister René McNiff, RSM, former president and chief executive officer of . St. James Mercy Hospital, Hornell, and Mercy System of the Southern Tier, died Sept. 26, 1999, after a long battle with cancer. She was 76.

A native of Rochester, Sister René entered the Sisters of Mercy in 1941, and professed perpetual vows in 1947. She served as a schoolteacher and principal for 20 years at St. James School, Rochester; Holy Family Grammar School, Auburn; and Our Lady of Mercy High School in Brighton.

In 1966, Sister René became St. James Mercy Hospital's president, a position she held until 1990. William Connor, the hospital's current president, worked as an administrator for Sister René for 25 years and remembered her fondly.

"She was quite a woman," he said. "She liked to involve a lot of people. She was very straightforward. You knew where she stood on a subject."

While president of St. James, Sister René presided over a \$23 million ex-
