## Council addressed salvation

#### To the editors:

In response to the Jan. 20, 2000 letter to the editor "The Bible specifies what we must do to be saved," below are excerpts from the Dogmatic Constitution on the Church promulgated by the Second Vatican Council:

'The Church recognizes that in many wavs she is linked with those who, being baptized, are honored with the name of Christian, though they do not profess the faith in its entirety, or do not preserve unity of communion with the successor of Peter. ...

"... (W)e can say that in some real way they are joined with us in the Holy Spirit, for to them also He gives His gifts and graces, and is thereby operative among them with his sanctifying power. ... (No. 15).

"Finally, those who have not yet received the gospel are related in various ways to the people of God. In the first place there is the people to whom the covenants and the promises were given and from whom Christ was born according to the flesh (cf. Rom 9:4-5). On account of their fathers, this people remains most dear to God, for God does not repent of the gifts he makes

#### nor of the calls he issues (cf. Rom 11:28-29).

"But the plan of salvation also includes those who acknowledge the Creator. In the first place among these are the Moslems ... Nor is God himself far distant from those who in shadows and images seek the unknown God ...

"Those also can attain to everlasting salvation who through no fault of their own do not know the gospel of Christ or his Church, yet sincerely seek God, and, moved by grace, strive by their deeds to do His will as it is known to them through the dictates of conscience. Nor does divine Providence deny the help necessary for salvation to those who, without blame on their part, have not yet arrived at an explicit knowledge of God, but who strive to live a good life, thanks to His grace. Whatever goodness or truth is found among them is looked upon by the Church as a preparation for the gospel. She regards such qualities as given by him who enlightens all men so that they may finally have life. ... (No. 16)"
