## Father John McManus, CSB, at 73

Father John Edward McManus, CSB, a Rochester native, died March 27, 2000, in Houston, Texas. He was 73.

Father McManus grew up in Our Ladv of Good Counsel parish and attended Good Counsel School and Aquinas Institute. He made his first vows in the Congregation of St. Basil in 1946, and was ordained a priest on June 29, 1955.

Father McManus received a master's degree at the University of Toronto in 1957. He went to work at the University of St.

Thomas in Houston in 1958. Among his responsibilities there was teaching Spanish and German. He retired in 1996.

He was predeceased by his brother, Robert, and is survived by his sister-in-law, Kathryn McManus of Fairport, and nephew, Daniel McManus.

Funeral services were held in the Chapel of St. Basil at the University of St. Thomas. A memorial Mass was celebrated at St. John of Rochester Church in Fairport April 7.

## Sister Helen Garrity; was longtime teacher, administrator at Holy Angels in Irondequoit

Sister Helen Garrity, whose ministry at Holy Angels Convent in Irondequoit totaled nearly 60 years, died March 6, 2000, at Mercy Hospital in Buffalo. She was 96.

Sister Garrity was born in Buffalo. She entered the Sisters of Our Lady of Charity in 1922 and professed her final vows in > 1925, taking the name Sister Immaculate Conception.

After teaching for eight years in Buffalo, Sister Garrity moved to Rochester in 1932 and began teaching at Holv Angels Home.

The institute, which had opened in 1930 at Holy Angels Convent, provided education for girls who came from difficult family situations and were referred to Holy Angels by courts and state agencies.

Sister Garrity became a fixture at the Irondequoit facility in the ensuing decades, serving in various administrative roles as Holy Angels Home expanded into a school.

"It was a semi-cloister because (the Holy Angels nuns) were so active with those young ladies," said Martin Q. Moll Sr., a

Catholic Courier board member who was also chairman of the Holy Angels Home board for 38 years.

Moll said that Sister Garrity exhibited strong, caring leadership in her work at Holy Angels. "She would just constantly be on top of any problem," he remarked.

In 1968 Sister Garrity was named president of the Sisters of Our Lady of Charity North American Federation. She moved to Wisconsin and stayed in that position until 1971, when she returned to Holy Angels.

Although Holy Angels School closed in 1976 and some of the campus buildings were sold, Sister Garrity continued to reside in Holy Angels Convent, 1280 Winton Road North, until she retired in 1994. She then moved to her order's convent in Hamburg, Erie County.

"She was a magnificent lady," Moll commented. "I couldn't hold any human being in higher esteem. She was the essence of purity, the essence of love."

Sister Garrity is survived by three sisters who are also Sisters of Our Lady of Charity: Sister Dorothy Garrity, Sister Mark Garrity and Sister Bernadette Garrity. Other survivors are her sisters Martha Eileen Robinson, Grace Veral and Jane Ritz; and several nieces and nephews.

Sister Garrity's funeral Mass was celebrated March 10, 2000, at Our Lady of Charity Convent in Hamburg. Interment was at Holy Cross Cemetery in Lackawanna, Erie County.
