Michael Tedesco takes communications post

Michael Tedesco, who has served since 1997 as associate communications director with the United Way of Greater Rochester Inc., has been named the director of communications for the Diocese of Rochester.

Tedesco, 39, has more than 15 years of public relations experience in the Rochester area. He will begin his position with the diocese on July 10.

"I'm attracted to working for my diocese in what I see as a step forward professionally," Tedesco said. "I want the opportunity to get to know Bishop (Matthew) Clark better because I've heard he is such a great leader."

The communications position had been vacant since Tedesco's predecessor, Elizabeth Brown, left in April 1999. Father Joseph Hart, diocesan vicar general and Pastoral Center moderator, made the hire. He and a search committee had interviewed candidates since October.

"We were not willing to hire someone who didn't have all the pieces," Father Hart said of the lengthy search process.

Father Hart said that Tedesco brings valuable experience from his two most recent positions. Based on his work with the United Way, Father Hart said that Tedesco's awareness of stewardship and development will help with diocesan fundraising efforts.

Tedesco also served for 10 years as communications manager with the Gates-Chili School District. Father Hart said that Tedesco's work in an expansive school sys-
