## Schools celebrate 200 years

On Sept. 22, diocesan Catholic schools joined Catholic schools across the state in celebrating the 200th anniversary of the first Catholic school to open in New York state. The first Catholic school in New York was St. Peter's School in Lower Manhattan of New York City, which opened in September 1800. It had 100 students. The state also was only one diocese at the time of St. Peter's opening, and was called the Diocese of New York.

Today 304,000 students attend 853 Catholic schools in the state. In the Diocese of Rochester, more than 13,000 students attend 54 Catholic elementary and junior high schools. In addition, 3,500 students attend Catholic high schools in the diocese.

Schools across the diocese held individual "birthday parties" in honor of the 200th celebration. The celebration at St. Mary's School in Canandaigua concluded with ice cream cones, said to have been invented 200 years ago.
