the affliction of my people in Egypt, and I have heard their complaint. I have come to rescue them, and lead them in-



The word "exodus" comes from the Latin form of the Greek word that means to leave or depart (we have a similar word; "exit"). The departure was by the Israelites from the slavery of Egypt. Because there were so many Israelites, the Egyptian Pharaoh was afraid they would try to take over his country, so he forced them to work as slaves. But God was watching over his people. He chose Moses, who was raised by Pharaoh's own daughter, to lead the Israelites into a land of milk and honey But Pharaoh did not give up his slaves easily God sent 10 plagues on Egypt until Pharaoh told Moses to take his people and go Even then, Pharaoh

sent his army to follow and kill the Israelites. God parted the Red Sea and, after his people had crossed safely, the waters closed up again and swallowed the Egyptian army. The Israelites wandered for 40 years until they reached the promised land of Canaan

She reformed many convents and founded 17 new ones. We honor her on March 6.

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


