John relays message from vision

The Lord has instructed me. John. your brother, to write letters to the seven churches in Asia. May the grace and peace of Jesus Christ be with you always. I want to describe some of the things I saw while I was on the island of Patmos. I was imprisoned there because I proclaimed God's word and gave testimony to Jesus.

It happened on the Lord's Day. I was caught up in a spirit, and I heard a voice behind me that was as loud as a trumpet say to me, "Write on a scroll what you see and send it to the seven churches: to Ephesus, Smyrna, Pergamum, Thyatira, Sardis, Philadelphia and Laodicea."

I wondered who had spoken to me, so I turned around to see who was there. I saw a man standing by seven golden lampstands. He wore an ankle-length robe with a gold sash around his chest. His hair was so white, like wool or snow, and his eyes were like flames of fire. In his right hand were seven stars, and his face was as bright as the sun in the middle of summer. I fainted at his feet, as if I had just dropped dead.

The man touched me and said, "Do not be afraid. I am the first and the last, the one who lives. Once I was dead, but now I hold the keys to death and the netherworld.

They spent time praying and working the gardens that provided their food. Stephen was so moved by the lifestyles of the monks that he sent his friend on to Rome and he joined the monks:

Later he and some of the monks felt the spiritual atmosphere of their religious community had faded, so they moved to Citeaux, a dreary place deep in the forest. After one abbot had left and another had died; Stephen became the abbot of the new monastery. His severe philosophy made it difficult for the monastery to receive money it needed and not many novices joined them. But 30 wealthy noblemen asked to join and the monastery prospered spiritually and financially. Stephen is known as co-founder of the Cistercian Order. We honor Stephen on April 17.
