a Coult so Local ties key to World Youth Day

The Rochester Diocese will have a distinct leadership presence at World Youth Day 2002. That's no small accomplishment for an event that's expected to draw sever-including Pope John Paul II.

The local hook begins with Father Thomas Rosica, CSB, who grew up in Rochester's St. Ambrose Parish and attended Aquinas Institute prior to becoming a Basilian priest in 1986. Father Rosica, 42, was appointed in 1999 as national director and chief executive officer for World Youth Day by the Canadian Conference of Catholic Bishops.

Father Rosica has big plans to involve young adults from the Rochester Diocese in this event, a full year before it even begins. Beginning this summer, a select number of young adults will serve internships at the World Youth Day office in Toronto.

Working with the department heads, the interns will gain experience that should prove valuable when they return next summer in leadership roles on a volunteer staff of - get this - 25,000 people.

"They will have known the ropes and we will be relying on them heavily," Father Rosica said of the interns.

Father Rosica said he's inviting volunteers "particularly with the Rochester connection" because of his own ties to the area. They will work alongside young-adult interns from Italy, France, Germany, Lebanon, Canada and the United States.

"The World Youth Day is for young people, by young people. That's something I've been insisting on," Father Rosica said.

World Youth Day will be held in Toronto July 22-28, 2002. This international celebration, which normally occurs every two years, was begun by Pope John Paul in 1985 to unite young Catholics worldwide. Father Rosica said 150 countries are expected to take part next year.

Nora Bradbury-Haehl, diocesan program specialist for youth and young-adult ministry, said she's searching for approximately 10 people to serve internships of at least three weeks - longer, if desired during the upcoming year. Intern candidates can come from anywhere in the diocese, and must be between the ages of 18 and 35. Applications can be obtained by calling Bradbury-Haehl at 716/328-3210,


