From 1961-68, Father Norris was chaplain at the State School at Industry. He stayed at Blessed Sacrament until he was named pastor of Church of the Assumption in Fairport in 1980. He retired from Assumption in 1991, and has lived at St. Catherine of Siena Parish in Mendon since then.

Father Sebastian A. Falcone was the first president of St. Bernard's Institute, from 1981-92, and has continued to teach biblical studies there since he left his presidency. He currently resides in his Brighton home, and

assists at St. Anne Parish, Rochester. Born in 1927, Father Falcone grew up attending St. Anthony's Church and School in Rochester. He then attended St. Lawrence Seminary and Novitiate in Beacon, N.Y., before attending Immaculate Conception Seminary in the Bronx and then Our Lady of Angels Seminary in Staunton, Va. 
