Rochester firm joins renovation team

ROCHESTER – LaBella Associates, P.C., a Rochester architectural company specializing in church renovation, will serve as the local firm for the planned Sacred Heart Cathedral renovation.

Robert A. Healy, vice-president of La-Bella Associates, said he was notified of his firm's appointment May 16 in a letter from James F. Williamson, partner at Williamson Pounders Architects in Memphis, Tenn.

Williamson is the cathedral project's lead architect. Healy said LaBella Associates will carry out many of the project's on-site details, such as contractor bids and planning 2 zoning issues with city officials.

"We're here to support Jim Williamson," Healy said.

Already, LaBella Associates is gathering documents from Sacred Heart's archives in an effort to assemble the cathedral's architectural history. "We're still in hopes of recovering other documents. Obviously, anything we can find is beneficial," Healy said.

Healy said his firm's involvement will increase "as we get into production." The renovation is due to take place in 2003 and 2004.

Healy, a parishioner of St. Louis in Pittsford, said he has attended several services at Sacred Heart over the years and remarked that numerous upgrades are in order. The cathedral's last major renovation was more than 50 years ago.

"It's a wonderful building, but it also needs to be maintained," Healy commented. He cited lighting, sound, handicap access and a gathering space as some of the chief areas to be addressed.

Regarding the more controversial changes being discussed, such as moving the tabernacle to a special devotional area, Healy deferred to Father Richard Vosko, an Albany diocesan priest who is serving as liturgical design consultant. "That's Dick's role. That's what he was hired for," Healy said. Healy said that 75 percent of LaBella's projects are church renovations, most of them Catholic churches in the Rochester Diocese. Recent and ongoing projects include St. Catherine of Siena, Mendon; St. Patrick's, Victor (parish center); St. Louis, Pittsford; Church of the Assumption, Fairport; St. Theodore, Gates; St. Bridget, Rochester; and St. Anne, Rochester.

Healy acknowledged that LaBella Associates was also a candidate to be the Sacred Heart project's lead architect. Williamson was selected for that post in mid-March by cathedral and diocesan officials, as well as members of the Sacred Heart Renovation Committee. Healy noted that the decision was likely influenced by the fact that Williamson and Father Vosko have collaborated on other church projects, including cathedrals.

However, Healy said he sent a followup letter to Bishop Matthew H. Clark stating that LaBella Associates would be still interested in a supporting role for the cathedral project.

Sister Jean Marie Ledsome, of the Franciscan Sisters, Third Order Regular, of Penance of the Sorrowful Mother, in Steubenville, Ohio, recently made her first profession of vows with three other women before Bishop Gilbert Sheldon of the Steubenville, Ohio, diocese.
