

And perhaps God was waiting for Habakkuk to take a stand of faith and



People who lived in and around Israel during the times of the Old and New Testaments were not able to go the grocery store for their food. and they did not have ingredients or nutritional information printed on their food packages. They didn't even have food packages. Yet the food they ate provided everything that a nutritionist of today would consider necessary for a healthy, balanced diet.

In Genesis, God declared that he had made plants and fruits for people to eat. A diet that includes fruits and vegetables provides fiber, vitamins, minerals and nutrients: Most families could not afford meat very often. St. Vincent De Paul


Vincent De Paul grew up on a small farm with his three brothers and two sisters. Hoping to create an opportunity for his son to succeed, Vincent's father placed him in the care of the Franciscan Recollects. Vincent was able to study at the University of Toulouse and, in 1600, he was ordained a priest. He was 20 years old at the time.

When Vincent went to Paris he made friends with a priest who recommended that Vincent become the tutor of the children of the Count of Joigny. After hearing the confession of a man who was dying, Vincent was inspired to preach to the people of that man's community about repentance and the forgiveness of sins. The response was so positive that Vincent had to ask the Jesuits of Amiens to help him. Vincent later became a spiritual minister to King Louis XIII and Anne of Austria. He died in 1660 of poor health. He is the patron saint of charitable societies and we remember him on Sept. 27.
