Three high-school squads draw closer to state titles

The privilege of reaching the post-season comes with a cold reality: One defeat, and your year is done. But with a few more wins, three Catholic high-school teams in the diocese won't have to experience that feeling.

Playoff action last week produced a sectional football champion, as well as two soccer teams that advanced to the state semifinals. In addition, a runner won an individual state cross-country title and a swimmer earned two sectional first-place finishes.

Aquinas Institute football rolled to a 49-32 win over Victor in the Section 5 Class A final Nov. 9. The victory hiked Aquinas' record to 9-1 and vaulted the Little Irish into the state-tournament quarterfinals. AQ will play Saturday, Nov. 17, at 3 p.m. against Pioneer of Section 6. The game will be held at the University of Rochester's Fauver Stadium.

The shootout win over Victor saw the Little Irish fall behind 8-0 before running off 21 unanswered second-quarter points to take a 36-14 halftime lead. Calvin Hall led the Irish with three touchdown runs, and guarterback Mark Magliocco ran for a touchdown and also completed TD throws of 43 and 32 yards, both to Kevin McMahan. Arel Gordon added a 45-yard scoring run

AQ's offensive eruption mirrored its sectional semifinal win over Batavia Nov. 3, when the Irish sprinted to a 35-0 halftime lead and won 35-6.

Our Lady of Mercy girls soccer took one step closer to a perfect season by knocking off Grand Island, 2-0, in a battle of unbeatens Nov. 9. The state quarterfinal win sends the Monarchs (23-0) into a Class A semifinal game Nov. 16 against Monroe-Woodbury of Section 9 at Brockport High School (4 p.m. start). The championship contest is set for Nov. 17 at 1 p.m. on the same field.

Mercy's win over Grand Island saw Beth

Kunkel and Aimee Lambert score just four minutes apart early in the second half. Goalie Katie Dry recorded the shutout as the Monarchs preserved their No. 1 state ranking in eliminating the Vikings, who came into the game with an identical 22-0 record.

The victory came six days after Mercy won the Section 5 Class A title, 3-1, over Churchville-Chili.

Aquinas Institute girls' soccer (12-7-1), which didn't even have a winning record when post-season play began, now looks much more like the AQ team that won last year's state crown. The Irish won 3-1 over Livonia in a state Class B qualifying game Nov. 6, then topped Williamsville East 4-1 in quarterfinal play Nov. 9. Aquinas now

Unfortunately, Aquinas boys' soccer will not have a chance to defend its own state title. The Little Irish saw their season end with a 3-2 loss to Livonia in a state Class B qualifying game Nov. 6. Rafael Venturini and Keith Manscuk scored goals as Aquinas posted a final record of 15-3-1.

The Little Irish had defeated Pittsford Mendon, 2-1, in the Section 5 Class BB final Nov. 2.

Further individual success came from Our Lady of Mercy swimmer Betsy Ernst, who won two Section 5 Class B titles Nov. 9. She captured the 500-yard freestyle event with a time of 5 minutes, 28.24 seconds; and also placed first in the 100-yard breaststroke in 1:11.02.

School Sister of Notre Dame Joanna DeKleva died Oct. 23 at her order's Baltimore, Md. motherhouse, following a long illness. She was known as Sister Clementia when she taught in the Diocese of Rochester during the 1930s and '40s.
