After such a long time of hardship, this was such a wonderful message from God. When Zechariah had calmed down enough to listen again, the Lord spoke.




# **Bible Accent**


The book of Zechariah is a collection of prophesies that were written by him and one or two other men. They were written approximately 500 years before the birth of Jesus. After being set free following a long period of exile, the Israelites were trying to rebuild their community. One of the important tasks they set out to do was to rebuild the temple that had been destroyed. There are eight major visions recorded in this book, and one of the most important ideas was the coming of an anointed leader, a "Messiah," who would lead the Israelites. There is a reference to this Messiah riding triumphantly into Jerusalem. This prophecy came true on a day we celebrate as Palm Sunday. Jesus himself quoted from Zechariah, one example being when he said, "Strike the shepherd, and the sheep will be dispersed."

# St. Irenaeus

St. Irenaeus was a privileged man in many ways. He was born within a century after the life of Christ. He was raised in a part of Asia Minor where Christianity was strong, and he studied under people who had known some of the Apostes or people who had themselves studied under the Apostles. Irenaeus became an expert on the Scriptures and was very familiar with Greek literature and philosophy. Merchant trading was very active between Asia Minor and Europe, and along with the trade ships travelled many missionaries. Irenaeus became a missionary and went to a church in Lyons, in Gaul (we know it as France), serving as a priest under that church's first bishop, and eventually becoming bishop himself. Although Lyons had endured religious persecution, when Irenaeus was bishop there, peace had been restored. He wrote a five-volume book which refuted some of the Gnostic sects by using the teachings of Jesus and the Apostles. We honor Irenaeus on June 28.
