Greater financial transparency is necessary as litigations mount and some church leaders talk of possible bankruptcies, said the board of directors of Foundations and Donors Interested in Catholic Activities, known as FADICA, during the group's Jan. 24-25 meeting in Naples.

How can I help someone who is grieving?

The FADICA board praised the Chicago and Baltimore archdioceses and several dioceses for having already released amounts spent on sex-abuse cases.

Frank Butler, FADICA president, expressed hope that these examples "will influence the decisions of the nation's Catholic bishops to end the practice of financial secrecy surrounding this distressing chapter in church history."

The vast majority of the 177 Latin-rite dioceses in the United States are still without disclosure, said a FADICA press release about the meeting.

Last November, FADICA and the Gallup Organization released a national poll of churchgoing Catholics showing that 65 percent of respondents agreed that the church should be more financially accountable while 68 percent favored an annual independent audit of dioceses with the results made public.

Overall, 64 percent of the respondents said-the bishops had done a "bad job" in dealing with the problem of clergy sex abuse of minors. The survey had a margin of error of plus or minus 3.2 percent.

FADICA praised support for financial disclosure by the newly created Office of Child and Youth Protection of the USCCB.

Butler said the 16-member board unanimously approved a resolution supporting the work of the office and the National Review Board created by the bishops to oversee implementation of the bishops' policies on child abuse.
