Taking your teen to Mass


If you don't enjoy going to Mass—and make a point of letting your children know—don't be surprised if they start resisting going to liturgies when they become teenagers, according to Nora Bradbury-Haehl, youth ministry coordinator at St. Paul's Parish in Webster.

"(A parent) is sending the message that it's important to go to Mass, but then griping about the music and complaining all the way home," she said during an interview at her office.

A parent to one teenager herself. Bradbury-Haehl has given workshops for parents on getting teenagers interested in their faith and Mass. But what if a teenager confronts a parent with the "B" word about Mass, as in "It's boring!" Parishes often gear their liturgies to older, married people, she said, and rarely is the preaching designed with young people in mind. Bradbury-Haehl urged parents to discuss homilies with their children after Mass, so that they can find positive points together in what the homilist said.

On the other hand, Bradbury-Haehl added that teenagers have to learn that rituals of all sorts, including funerals and weddings, give people a sense of the importance of a moment.

"I've watched rituals help (young people) grieve and help them celebrate," she said. "Something I want for my children when these moments come along is to have a language to express themselves."

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On that note, parishes can help by introducing young people into the language and practice of liturgy. Young people can serve on the altar, lector, sing, cantor, usher, greet worshipers and play instruments, she said.

Bradbury-Haehl also pointed out that teenagers and children should be introduced to parish staff members, and parents who are also active in the church. That way, the church will become a home to them, and they won't think their "mom is the only weird church lady," she said with a chuckle.

Bradbury-Haehl also said it helps to talk with your kids about what the

church is *for*, not just what it's against. Equality, diversity, truth, justice, integrity and freedom are values the church espouses, she noted.

Bradbury-Haehl said if a teenager resists going to Mass, she suggests talking with him or her in a nonjudgmental way about why they don't like going to church, and sharing honestly with them what you believe about God.

Finally, Bradbury-Haehl said that parents can only be stewards of their teenagers' faith, and that ultimately, God will take care of the rest. Teenagers may wander away from the faith once they become adults, but parents should not unduly fret about such a possibility.

"God's ability to draw a child into God's heart is far beyond ours," she said.


